## **FOREWORD**

I am pleased to present this Annual Report 2021-22 which showcases many noble activities carried out by us with the support of many noble hearts. Our activities pertaining to sustainable development of rural and tribal community continued to make a positive impact in their lives and livelihood. Although this year too infectious corona virus hurdled our activities for most of the period but we achieved our target in all the programmes successfully, with our goal oriented team work following covid-19 protocol.

With the blessings of the Holy Trio-Sri Ramakrishna, Maa Sarada Devi and Swami Vivekananda, 'Divyayan', the rural development wing of this Ashrama executed all the programmes related to integrated development of rural tribal villages in Ranchi and its adjoining districts through convergence, collaboration, collective approach in the same manner as it has been doing tirelessly for over **53** years for which it has won many awards, accolades and appreciations in both Zonal and National Level.

After the successful development of **organic villages** viz. Burhakocha, Dhurleta, Piprabera, Gundlitoli, Simratoli and Nagrabera under Angara Block of Ranchi District, different projects and programmes were converged for Nawagarh Panchayat to develop it into an **organic Panchayat** and required infrastructures are being developed under the model tribal panchyat development programme.

Divyayan successfully continued its endeavor of integrating the schooling of tribal youth with vocational skill and value education, as envisaged by Swami Vivekananda, through the convergence of the National Institute of Open Schooling (NIOS), Divyayan KVK training programmes and Ramakrishna Mission Vivekananda Educational Research Institute(RKMVERI) to make the youths self reliant and moral. **38 coaching centres**, running under 'Akhandananda Shiksha and Sanskar Prakalpa' to provide rural tribal students an opportunity to develop themselves - physically, mentally and spiritually through formal education, games, extra co-curricular activities, yoga, prayer etc. There are other similar coaching centres in different villages which are directly run by respective Vivekananda Seva Sangha. Maa Sarada Gurukul has been started this year to help the primitive tribe(Birhore) children grow in their native environment.

Divyayan Krishi Vigyan Kendra, successfully pursued its regular activities like skill development programmes among rural tribal youths, Self Help Groups' involvement in the village upliftments, front line demonstrations, on-farm trials, field days, weekly medical camps etc for the integrated development of rural people through integrated education and integrated farming. It also carried on its effort to achieve the target of **Five-Zero goals** viz. (I) Zero conventional energy use (ii) Zero water loss (iii) Zero chemicals usage (iv) Zero plastic zone land (v) Zero-waste management. Presently students from different colleges, universities also are coming to get training from Divyayan.

This Ashrama continued its integrated rural development activities through mobile dispensary, mobile library-cum-audio visual unit. The static library in the Ashrama campus was visited by **20502** readers and the dispensary catered its services to **4433** patients during the reporting period.

The faculty centre of Ramakrishna Mission Vivekananda Educationational Research Institute(RKMVERI) successfully conducted 6 different courses including B.Sc.(Ag) Hons. and provided its academic service to **428** students during the reporting period.

The activities for developing Nawagarh Panchayat of Angara Block into a model tribal-panchayat in a sustainable way are underway. Online and offline monitoring, meetings were carried out through the already established computer centre. With convergence of different Govt. sponsored schemes and the active participation of Vivekananda Seva Sanghas (VSS), many activities related to agriculture and allied trades, health and hygiene were undertaken to achieve the giant target of developing a **Model Tribal-Panchayat.** 

As per the plan, 3 units of video conferencing system in 3 Block level organizations for teaching & counseling of rural children, meeting, monitoring and training etc. were established and successfully running as per our objectives.

It is no gain-saying the fact that with all the activities, Divyayan has become a model training-cum-demonstration centre for different Universities, Govt. Departments, NGOs etc.

None of the achievements in the reporting year would have been possible without the efforts, relentless services and co-operation of all monks, honourable members of the Managing Committee, volunteers, devotees, supporters, admirers and staff members who stood, as always, by us both financially and physically. I extend my heartfelt thanks and congratulations to all.

## A. About Us

#### Ramakrishna Math & Ramakrishna Mission

The twin organisations Ramakrishna Math & Ramakrishna Mission (having branches all over India as well as in other parts of the World) bearing the name of Sri Ramakrishna, the prophet of harmony of all religions, were started by Swami Vivekananda in May 1897.

The Math was registered as a Trust in 1901 and the Mission was duly registered in 1909 under Society Registration Act XXI of 1860 (Reg. No. 1971/3 of 1909-10).

At present the Ramakrishna Order has 265 centres including 67 outside India(as on 31st March, 2022).

There are 44 sub-centres (14 within India, 30 outside India) under different centres.

These branches are engaged in diverse activities in the field of medical, educational, cultural, social, spiritual, rural and tribal upliftment, relief and rehabilitation (Disaster Management).

Swami Vivekananda had a vision to establish a technical school and gradually a centre in the tribal area of Chotanagpur where new ways of food production would be discovered. In this context he mentioned that in central India, near Hazaribagh and such other districts of the region of Jharkhand (then a part of Bihar), a big plot of land would have to be acquired for the purpose.

The vision of Swami Vivekananda took shape with the establishment of an Ashrama at Ranchi in 1927 by Srimat Swami Vishuddhananda, the direct disciple of Holy Mother Sarada Devi, and the 8th President of Ramakrishna Order.

### Divyayan Krishi Vigyan Kendra

In early sixties, when Ranchi and its adjoining districts were in the grip of severe drought, Ramakrishna Mission Ashrama, Morabadi, organised a relief work for the distressed poor. During that period it was strongly realized that unless the poor and illiterate farmers are trained in need based agriculture and allied technologies supported by group action, they can not be made self-reliant and also would never be able to counter similar adverse condition in future. In order to fulfill the above requirements 'Divyayan' (meaning Divine Way), a novel integrated rural development model, intended to worship God in man, was conceived and finally launched by this centre in 1969.

A residential training centre for tribal and rural youth in agriculture and related activities, Divyayan was recognized by the Indian Council of Agricultural Research (ICAR) as a Krishi Vigyan Kendra (KVK) in 1977.

Divyayan KVK got the Best KVK Award of ICAR, New Delhi at National Level, for the period 1996-97 and 2016-17 and Zonal Level during the period 2016-17. It has been once again awarded as the best KVK for the year 2019-20 by the famous outlook group.

## **B.** Objectives

Motto: The motto of the Ashrama, as formulated by Swami Vivekananda, is "Atmano Mokshartham Jagad Hitaya Cha", "For one's own salvation and for the welfare of the world".

The Ashrama has adopted six objectives for integrated development of the rural tribal people as follows:

- ♦ Economic ♦ Social ♦ Health Related ♦ Educational ♦ Cultural ♦ Spiritual
- The economic objective is achieved through training imparted to the grass root level young farmers and school drop-outs, especially belonging to the backward section of rural community, in modern technology as applicable to the field of agriculture and allied areas for increasing per unit land area per family output and thus helping the people become self reliant.
- The social objective is carried out by imbibing the spirit of community living, developing sense of co-(b) operation, acquiring youth leadership qualities, instilling group action and self-confidence with a view to promote national integration at all levels.
- (c) The health care objective is accomplished by organising weekly medical camps, special medical camps, health awareness camps, total sanitation and drinking water awareness, creating and educating the people for participating in vaccination programmes, providing health care to the last person of the rural area.
- The educational objective is achieved by guiding the local youths for establishing primary schools, enrolling the drop outs in National Institute of Open Schooling and through Diploma, Graduate and Post graduate teaching programmes of Ramakrishna Mission Vivekananda Educational and Research Institute (RKMVERI).
- The cultural objective is achieved by promoting and encouraging local culture based on the Indian ancient culture and traditions.
- The spiritual objective is achieved by spreading the doctrine of oneness of all souls, toleration and (f) acceptance of all faiths/religions and fostering universal brotherhood, non-sectarian approach and spiritual values in daily life to achieve the highest purpose of life.



## The Infrastructure

Divyayan KVK, already having excellent basic facilities for farmers & rural youth to update their knowledge & skill through residential training programmes, was further developed (i)during the year 2009-2010 with construction of a new Conference Hall and a Mist Chamber for hardening plants produced by the Tissue Culture Laboratory; (ii) during the year 2013-14, with construction of a 100-bed Farmers' Hostel under the name of Swami Vivekananda Kisan Chhatravas; (iii) during 2015-16 with the renovation of Permanent Exhibition on Swami Vivekananda's Life and Message and (iv)during 2016-17 with the establishment of 10 KV solar grid with solar panel & solar water heater and creating water harvesting structures , (v) during 2017-18 by starting construction of farm boundary and road within the campus, development of brick soled paddock and during 2018-19, establishing 25 KV solar grid with solar panel, 3 storey Poultry Demonstration unit and Twin Bio Gas Plants, completing excavation of 3 new ponds, renovation of all old ponds, construction of 2 new wells and Farm boundary road .

During 2021-22, the Ashrama continued its endeavors towards addressing the root causes of unemployment in rural tribal villages, through its unique model of residential training programmes to build confidence in rural youths and enable them to launch their own enterprises. There are three types of training programmes, which are offered by Divyayan KVK viz. On-campus, Off-campus specialized courses and NIOS linked multi skill training curriculum with value education at their core.

All these training programmes are mainly meant for tribal youths with free board and lodging facility sponsored partially by the Ministry of Tribal Affairs (MoTA), Govt. of India; Deptt. of Welfare, Govt. of Jharkhand; Indian Council of Agricultural Research (ICAR) through KVK and others.

#### Training Programmes for Rural Youth in Agriculture and Allied Trade (On-campus)

Objective of this training programme is to make the trainee self reliant by launching his own enterprise. Hence every trainee needs to undergo extensive practical training. Every effort is made to change the mind set of the trainees and to make them sincere, disciplined and co-operative. Emphasis is also given on developing managerial skills and they are being exposed to real life circumstances to empower them to face any eventuality that may arise during the running of their own enterprises. Training is given in different trades viz. Bee-keeper, Lac Producer, Mali Training/Supervisor, Mushroom Producer, Soil Health Management, Fisheries, Organic Grower, Poultry, Dairy, Pump Repairing, Electrician, Carpentry and Welding. These courses are of 1.5 month, 3 months, and 6 months duration depending upon the trade. During the reporting period (2021-22), 295 trainees were provided training in different trades.

#### Training Programme on Integrated Farming System for Practicing Farmers and Farm Women (Off-campus)

Training programmes on "Integrated Farming" of 45-days duration are conducted in villages for practicing farmers and farm women as they are unable to attend the long duration residential training programme due to lack of time and their engagement in farming. These training programmes are conducted on different

thematic areas like Bee Keeping, lac production, mushroom production etc. During the reporting period (2021-22), **501** trainees were trained in **10** batches.

#### **Sponsored Training Programme**

Sponsored training programmes are conducted for different participants sponsored by different govt. and non-govt. organisations. These custom made courses are of 3-days, 5 days, 10days and 15 days duration.

### **Short Course Training Programme**

These training programmes are mainly for the practicing farmers and rural youth which are conducted under skill development programme of Krishi Vigyan Kendra project.

## NIOS Linked Multi Skill Training Programme with Moral and Spiritual Education

During the reporting year 2021-22, 46 students were enrolled in Secondary and 101 in Senior Secondary courses of NIOS along with vocational courses of Divyayan. It is a novel approach to effect synergy of instructions, i.e. integration of skill development education and academic education along with moral and spiritual education.





## D.2.b Organising V.S.S. (Vivekananda Seva Sangha), Quarterly Magazine and Audio Visual Programme

Vivekananda Seva Sangha: Once Swami Vivekananda had said "All the wealth in the world can not help one little Indian village if the people are not taught to help themselves". Acting on this message, our extrainees are encouraged to form village level organizations named Vivekananda Seva Sagha (VSS). Extension and village activities are executed through these VSSs. They work collectively for the development of their own village, harnessing the internal potentialities as well as available resources not depending on help from

outside. Till date 120 nos. of VSSs have been formed which are successfully functioning in their respective localities.


Publication of Quarterly Magazine Prabuddha Gram (Awakened Village): This Ashrama has been serving the rural people of Jharkhand for more than 50 years. Over the years we have developed a lot of technologies, a number of successful farmers and undertaken many research works through our Krishi Vigyan Kendra and RKMVERI for the development of the rural poor.

Swami Vivekananda said "Hence our object is to see that everyone down to chandal be helped to attain the right to. Dharma, Artha, Kama and Moksha."

Keeping the above aim in mind, a quarterly bilingual (Hindi and English) rural development magazine "PRABUDDHA GRAM (Awakened Village)" is published to disseminate these technologies, knowledge from experience and research findings among different stakeholders of rural development in India especially in Jharkhand, The first issue (April - June 2021) was published in the month of July 2021.

This quarterly magazine replaced the Monthly News Letter Divyayan Samachar.

Visit of Mobile Audio-Visual Unit in Villages: A vehicle, fully equipped with audio-visual devices, moves extensively in the villages as per scheduled programme. This unit is equipped with T.V., DVD/CD players, multimedia projector, CDs and DVDs, to conduct shows on various aspects of rural development, agricultural production and spirituality. This year in total 79 shows were held involving 4116 nos. of beneficiaries

## D.2.d Hon'ble Prime Minister Sri Narendra Modi's Address during 'National Conclave on Natural Farming (Zero Budget Natural Farming)

Prime Minister, Shri Narendra Modi addressed the farmers during the National Conclave on Natural Farming on 16th December 2021 in Anand, Gujarat via video-conferencing. The live telecast of this program was shown in the auditorium of Divyayan Krishi Vigyan Kendra, Ramkrishna Mission Ashrama, Morabadi, Ranchi.

The programme was started at 10.00 am with technical session in which Dr. Ajeet Kumar Singh, discussed the theme of program "Building Expanding Natural Farming System". He said that Zero Budget Natural Farming is a promising tool to minimise the dependence of farmers on purchased inputs, and reduces the cost of agriculture by relying on traditional field-based technologies which leads to improved soil health. Swami Bhaveshananda, secretary of Ashrama talked about benefits of organic farming in Ranchi district. He said that 12 villages of Ranchi district are doing completely organic farming in the guidance of scientists of Divyayan Krishi Vigyan Kendra.

At 11.00 am live telecast of this program was shown to the farmers. In the said program Prime Minister Narendra Modi said fertilisers helped to increase the produce and led to the green revolution but there is a need to keep looking for alternatives. He added that natural farming offers a much better produce with no side effects. He said from seed to soil, every thing can be treated in a natural way. Natural farming does not involve spending on fertilisers nor on pesticides. It also requires less irrigation and is capable of dealing with floods and droughts, said PM Modi. Shri Narendra Singh Tomar discussed Natural farming and crop diversification in detail. Shri Amit Shah talked about maximizing the contribution of agriculture in GDP (Gross Domestic Product) by making farmers prosperous by natural farming system.

The programme was attended by the secretary of Ashrama Swami Bhaveshnand, Dr. Ajeet Kumar Singh, Senior Scientist & Head of Divyayan Krishi Vigyan Kendra, Dr. Raghav Thakur, Dean Ramkrishna Mission Vivekananda Educational & Research Institute, scientists of Divyayan Krishi Vigyan Kendra, Ranchi along with 300 farmers of Ranchi district.

## D.2.e Kisan Gosthi, Adaptive Research (CFLD, FLD and OFT)

**Kisan Gosthi:** These are conducted to apprise the farmers about different technologies involved in production of different crops and to have direct interaction with farmers. This year 10 Kisan Gosthis were organized involving 477 farmers.

#### Cluster Front Line Demonstration (CFLD) and Front Line Demonstration (FLD):

The field demonstration conducted under the close supervision of scientists is called Front Line Demonstration, as the technologies are demonstrated for the first time by the scientists before being fed into the main extension system of the State Department of Agriculture. The main objective of CFLD/FLD is to demonstrate newly released crop production and different technologies and its management practices in the farmers' field under different agroclimatic region and farming situation. During 2021-22, CFLD and FLD programmes were conducted on 19 different crops/technologies/implements like paddy, wheat, niger, green gram, mustard, tomato etc. involving 601 farmers. Feed back from the involved farmers have been properly collected and provided to respective research institutions.

## **On-Farm Trial (OFT)**

Objective of this activity is to assess the technologies based on local problems to best fit the socio-economic condition of the farmers and to identify the production constraints. During 2020-21, 12 nos. of On-Farm Trials have been conducted on different crops involving 158 farmers, in different villages of Ranchi District. Details of the OFTs conducted during the year are as given below.

## D.2.g ICAR-ARYA Project (Attracting and Retaining Youths in Agriculture)

ARYA project with financial support of ICAR, New Delhi was started in the year 2019. The main objective of the project was to reinstate rural youths to the farming system so that this dynamic work force can be positively re-engaged for improvement of livelihood. To fulfil the objective three enterprises namely goatery, lac Cultivation and Bee Keeping were chosen under the project.

#### Summary of major activities which were undertaken during 2021-22

### **Goatery Enterprise:**

- Initially, from the project area, **260** nos. of potentially resource-rich youths were identified from Medhetungri, Getalsud.
- Selected youths were trained in **9** groups intensively in scientific goat farming.
- No. of Youths established entrepreneurial units (No.) 179
- ♦ Five groups of 37 farmers each were formed.
- Further these groups were given exposure at a unit of goat entrepreneur, developed under ARYA & DBT as well as at goatery farm of Birsa Agriculture University, Ranchi to improve their skill for running enterprise successfully.
- **EXAMPLE 2** KVK provided input support to each beneficiary for establishment of their enterprise.
- ♦ KVK distributed 32 nos. of improved breed of goat namely Black Bengal, 40 nos. of feeder, 61 nos of thermometer, syringe, medicine kit & needle and 10116 nos. of vaccine in project village.115 raised platform for goats were constructed for same number of beneficiaries.

#### Outcome:

- At present **179** farmers have developed a successful and profitable enterprise in goatery after KVK interventions like housing management with raised platform, breed improvement, regular vaccination and time to time providing of advisory services in project villages.
- 68 No. of youths running entrepreneurial units in a sustainable manner.
- Each beneficiary has maintained minimum 21 goats.
- The mortality rate in goats which was 24 % in the beginning has decreased to 13 %.
- Presently each beneficiary is able to generate an income of Rs. 80500/unit/year.
- The youths under the project are supporting their families with good socio-economic status and also working as social motivator.
- Every beneficiary is ready to invest more money in expansion of their goat farm so that the goat farms can run in sustainable manner.

#### **Bee-Keeping Enterprise:**

♦ Initially, from the project area,134 nos. of potentially resource-rich youths were identified



- Selected youths were trained in 7 groups intensively in scientific bee-keeping.
- No. of Youths established entrepreneurial units (No.) 132
- ♦ Seven groups of 20 farmers each were formed to start the enterprise.
- **EXAMPLE 2** KVK provided input support to each beneficiary for establishment of their enterprise.
- KVK distributed 354 Bee boxes with colonies(254 italian +100 Indegenous), Knife 58 and bee vile 58 nos.

#### Outcome:

- ♦ 132 nos. Entrepreneurial units established under ARYA in bee keeping after KVK interventions like training, input distribution and follow-up.
- 68 No. of youths running entrepreneurial units in a sustainable manner.
- ♦ Each beneficiary has maintained minimum 10 boxes.
- The mortality rate in bee-keeping which was 23 % in the beginning has decreased to 9 %.
- Presently each beneficiary is able to generate an income of Rs. 66000/unit/year
- The youths under the project are supporting their families with good socio-economic status and also working as social motivator.
- Every beneficiary is ready to invest more money in expansion of their goat farm so that the goat farms can run in sustainable manner

#### Lac Enterprise:

- Initially, from the project area,111 nos. of potentially resource-rich youths were identified
- Selected youths were trained in 5 groups intensively in scientific bee-keeping.
- ♦ Five groups of 27 farmers each were formed to start the enterprise.
- **XVK** provided input support to each beneficiary for establishment of their enterprise.
- ♦ KVK distributed 130 kg brood lac, Goture Spray M/c -4nos, Tree Pruner -8nos., looper -16, plastic drum-10nos., seketor 109 nos. and pesticide and fungicide 54ltrs.

## **Outcome:**

- ♦ 106 nos. Entrepreneurial units established under ARYA in bee keeping after KVK interventions like training, input distribution and follow-up.
- ♦ 85 No. of youths running entrepreneurial units in a sustainable manner.
- Each beneficiary has maintained minimum 15host plants.
- The mortality rate in lac cultivation which was 23 % in the beginning has decreased to 9 %.
- Presently each beneficiary is able to generate an income of Rs. 46500/unit/year
- The youths under the project are supporting their families with good socio-economic status and also working as social motivator.



## **D.3 Women Empowerment**

Women, in the tribal dominated areas of Ranchi and its adjoining areas, have been suffering from various types of discriminations and deprivations due to poverty, low productivity, their primitive way of living and ignorance about socio- moral values. There is a great need to bring women into mainstream of economic activities.

Ramakrishna Mission Ashrama not only organized them to form self help groups but also conducted special training programmes for women in different fields related to skill upgradation. drudgery reduction, fruits and vegetables preservation, value addition, mushroom cultivation, piggery, fisheries, poultry and allied activities to empower them economically as well as socially. Alternative employment opportunities for women are generated through such training programmes. Increased income in the hands of rural women ensures better nutrition, better healthcare facilities and education for their children.

This Ashrama believes that economic empowerment of women with moral and spiritual values at the base will help make them powerful agents to bring about social change.



Besides organising workshops and training programmes for empowering rural women of Ranchi district, On Farm Trials (OFTs) and Front Line Demonstration programmes related to the field of agro based entrepreneurship are also conducted every year. During the reporting period, one OFT (On Farm trial) on "Assessment of Quality Protein Maize (QPM) based weaning/ enriched food for child health" was completed. The study was conducted in two villages i.e Lundari and Katangdiri of Ranchi district. The trial had positive impact on children's health while using roasted and malted QPM (Quality Protein Maize) with roasted chickpea flour, roasted ground nuts, sugar and half cup of milk. Introduction of malted and roasted QPM (Quality Protein Maize) and chickpea flour (malted and roasted) was more fruitful for children of weaning age (1-3years). This formula of weaning is more helpful in reducing malnutrition among children. This study showed that consumption of cereal based (malted and roasted QPM and chickpea) food has great nutritional benefit since nutritional complementary can be achieved thought this meeting. Use of malted and roasted QPM based weaning food for children of 1-3 years of age is highly recommended for large scale of population (children). However, taste of technology option 2 was preferred among children. As far as normal maize and chickpea is concerned, dual germination and fermentation methods employed during the processing stages improved the nutritional qualities (protein contents, digestibility and amino acid composition) and haematological indices of the formulated complementary foods, respectively.

One more OFT (On farm Trial) on "Assessment of okra harvesting tool (Bhindi Plucker) for Drudgery Reduction of farm women" has been conducted this year. From the study, it was evident that women were involved in various agricultural operations which were carried out by traditional methods. As far as okra harvesting is concerned, due to lack of accessibility of modern tools and equipment they used to harvest okra manually. In this study, two types of okra harvesting tools have been introduced i.e. ring cutter and okra plucker. These okra harvesting tools were very effective for farm women as it reduces skin allergies, reduces the chances of cuts, rashes on finger and saves time. Hence the present study showed a positive impact by empowering farm women and bringing awareness about drudgery reducing equipment. It was also found that Farm women can harvest up to 10-12 kgs per hour in traditional method whereas by using ring cutter and okra plucker one can harvest up to 15-17 kgs per hour which implies that ring cutter and okra plucker are more effective than traditional method. These drudgery reducing equipment's not only improves the work performance of the farm women but also improves the health conditions of fingers from scratches, injuries and cuts.

Jackfruit is heavily produced in Ranchi district but not properly utilized due to lack of its processing / value addition knowledge. Delicious jackfruit is rich in energy, dietary fiber, minerals and vitamins. The fruit is high in calories and contains no saturated fats or cholesterol, making it one of the important healthy fruits to relish. To ensure year round availability of products of jackfruit, viable processing technology need to be developed and promoted which enables continuous supply and availability of jackfruit products and also to reduce post-harvest losses, transforming raw material into edible products, increasing food security, improving nutrition and health, generating increased income, etc. One such value added product was developed jackfruit squash which could also be taken to commercialization. A study was conducted on "Assessment of two different squash developed from ripe Jackfruit". The study introduces two types of jackfruit developed from ripe jackfruit and ripe mango. The developed squash was stored at room temperature and in refrigerator. After six months of storage, quality of the processed products (Jackfruit squash) regarding color, taste, flavour and texture were similar to that of freshly processed products. Farm women were highly satisfied with the processed product of ripe jackfruit. However some of them highly appreciated mango and jackfruit squash. This study was carried out in Katangdiri village of Ranchi district in which seven farm women participated. Farmers were trained about development of jackfruit squash.

Their participation in this study was highly appreciable. The developed squash was stored in sterilized glass bottles at room temperature and in refrigerator. While sensory evaluation of squash, it was found that even after six months of storage, quality of the processed products regarding color, taste, flavour and texture were similar to that of freshly processed products.

Thus, Ramkrishna Mission Ashram is playing an important role in empowering rural women through various training programs, workshops, seminars, on farm trials, front line demonstrations and extension activities.

## **D4. Production of Seed Material & Related Programmes**

The increase in agricultural production directly depends on the quality of seed. Seeds of appropriate characteristics are required to meet the demand of diverse agro-climatic conditions and intensive cropping system. The basic concept behind this programme is to develop a system which will ensure the timely supply of quality seeds to farmers at reasonable rates. To ensure the availability of quality seeds among the farmers, our endeavour is to produce high yielding varieties of the same to gear up the condition of marginal farmers and help lead the country to sufficiency.

During the year 2016-17, Divyayan KVK, in collaboration with the Govt. of Jharkhand had formed 25 seed villages where the farmers were provided with necessary skill and inputs to produce paddy seed. During 2017-18, under this programme 542 qtl paddy seeds, during 2018-19, 473.5 qtl paddy seeds, 75 qtl Kulthi, 50qtl Niger and 60 qtls of lentil seeds and during 2019-20, 300 qtl paddy seeds, 65qtl niger seeds and 60qtl horsegram seeds were produced by the farmers of the above said 25 villages. The produced seeds were procured by the National Seed Corporation, Ranchi from farmers.

Divyayan KVK itself has been optimally using its demonstration farm for the production of seeds and planting materials for the farmers of Ranchi district. Certified seeds were also produced in the farmers' field by providing them foundation seeds and technical guidance.

During the reporting period seeds of different crops and varieties were produced from our demonstration farms as well as by the farmers under Seed Village Programme as per the details given below to make them available to farmers and Govt. of Jharkhand for further distribution:

## D.5 Petroleum Conservation Campaign Sponsored by Petroleum Conservation and Research Association (PCRA)

The objective of the programme was to create mass awareness about the methods of effective conservation and efficient use of Petroleum Products (Petrol, Diesel, Kerosine etc.) through available technologies, good operational method and periodic maintenance of equipments, implements and tools used by the rural community in general and farming community in particular by Divyayan KVK in collaboration with PCRA

#### **Activities Undertaken**

Under this programme Agricultural Workshops were conducted in different villages of Ranchi district. Audio visual shows were conducted for better understanding of the technologies. Farmers were also motivated through displaying success stories. Details of the programme are as follows:

## D.6 Jharkhand Tribal Empowerment and Livelihoods Programme (JTELP) (27th April 2018 to 31st Dec 2021)

Ramakrishna Mission Ashrama, Divyayan, is the implementing agency for an IFAD -JTDS supported project-Jharkhand Tribal Empowerment and livelihood project (JTELP) in tribal locations of the Angara block of Ranchi district. The overall project goal is to "improve the living conditions of tribal people in general and PTGs in particular" through fostering community-based institutions, introduction of sustainable natural resource management systems and enhancing of food security and cash incomes by introducing improved farming practices and proven production technologies; 35 villages were covered under this project.

To harness and develop the potential of rural youth 7 Male Youth Group (YG), 3 Mix Youth Group (YG) and 5 Female Youth Group (FYG) have also been formed. Youth groups are doing extremely well in their business. The major achievement in agriculture was that of Khariff, Rabi and Zaid. In 2020-21 Rabi 1327.53 acre and Zaid 142.37 acre of fallow land was brought under cultivation. In Zaid more than Rs 1460548 was earned by different farmers by selling the creepers crops. RKM has also facilitated in developing papaya plantation in 2 acre in the project area.

Nutrition Garden is an improved form of kitchen garden where selected vegetable crops are grown systematically so as to meet the nutritional requirements of the family and to fight against anemia and malnourishment. Nutrition gardens are a micro-solution and an affordable way of ensuring healthy food and balanced nutrition. This year Nutrition garden was supported to 333 Households which consists of various crops like Lal saag, lady finger, bottle gourd, cucumber, bitter gourd & sponge gourd.

### D.7 JTDS Sponsored Apiary Project (27th April 2018 to 31st Dec 2021)

Keeping in view potential production of Honey in the State of Jharkhand, Divyayan Krishi Vigyan Kendra in collaboration with Jharkhand Tribal Development Society (JTDS) launched an Apiary Project with an objective of providing training on Scientific Apiculture to 500 tribal youths and to provide each of them with 5 Honey boxes along with bee colony to start their micro enterprise.

During the project period 505 tribal youths have been provided training from 90 villages of 4 districts viz Khunti, Latehar, Lohardaga and Ranchi. After the training they were also provided with bee boxes, stand, bee colonies, feeder, sulphur powder and sugar.

Apiculture and JTELP project of JTDS are under convergence for better hand holding and monitoring support. Community Resource Person (CRP) and Community Facilitator (CF) from JTELP project has been trained in pre and post care management of bee colonies , as handholding support systems. The training was conducted in presence of DPMU and Block level JTELP Team consisting of CRP, CF and Block level Executive from all 4 District of Jharkhand. Progressive farmer has been tied up with other beneficiaries for migration and market development.

500 beneficiaries have been provided Bee Boxes and other accessories like stand, Bee colonies, Honey Extractor, DB feeder etc. Each beneficiary was provided with 5 boxes, 5 stands, 5 Bee colonies, 5 DB feeder etc. One Honey extractor was provided for each 10 beneficiaries. 467 beneficiaries were provided italian bee boxes and 33 beneficiaries were provided indigenous boxes.





### D.8. Promotion of natural resource based organic farming

Agriculture is the main occupation for the 80% of rural population of the district because they are engaged in agriculture and allied field as their primary income generating activities for their livelihood. The major crop of the District are-paddy, finger millet, sorghum, maize, pigeon pea, black gram, gram, niger, mustard, and vegetables. Paddy is cultivated on around 80 percent of the gross cropped area. But the growth of modern scientific, input intensive agriculture has pushed production and productivity to wall.

So a project sponsored by ICAR - Sponsored ICAR-Directorate of Groundnut Research, Junagarh, Gujarat was conducted to promote organic farming as it has emerged as an alternative system of farming which not only addresses the quality and sustainability concerns, but also ensures a debt free, profitable livelihood option for tribal farmers.



- 1. Promoting Organic Farming for income generation
- 2. Upscaling of traditional goat farming in Ranchi district

Project Area: Gundlitoli & Simratoli village of Anagara Block, Ranchi

To meet the above said objective 50 beneficiaries of the project area were selected through Rapid Rural Appraisal and were provided a 5-day training on "Organic Farming based on local resource".

Then for developing organic cluster, NADEP pit, cow floor for easy collection of urine, dung and fodder waste for preparation of liquid manure, plantation related to agro-forestry was developed around the field of each farmer in the village for boosting production of foliage to be used as biomass resource in organic farming. Plastic drums/ cans were distributed among farmers for preparation of organic liquid manure and bio-pesticide. Farmers were also trained in preparing different types of liquid manure like beej sanjeevani, sasyagavya, panchgavya and bio pesticide like dasparni.

KVK scientists to solve problems of farmers while starting their own enterprise. The organic cluster was nurtured, guided and encouraged to grow and flourish as a model organic village.

### Demonstration of two tier poultry bird cum duck house

As a part of income generation and assets creation activity, 10 farmers of 5 different villages from Nawagarh Panchayat were selected having seen their poor economic condition and road side connectivity. The Duck cum poultry shed was provided to them by taking 10% contribution of Rs 4500 per unit . So that invested money will motivate the farmers to take proper care of poultry cum duck units. 13 poultry birds and 5 ducks of Khaki Campbel variety were given to each of the farmers.

### **Housing management for Goats**

It has been felt that Goat rearing is equally rewarding under both intensive and semi intensive systems of management. The project was implemented in Rahe, Lapung and Angara blocks of Ranchi where villages are surrounded by hills and forest areas and acres of barren land are found. Lack of assured irrigation facilities and cultivable land has led the villagers to adopt animal based farming as livelihood option.

After selection of the beneficiaries a 5-day training prgramme was conducted on "Scientific Goatery Management". Then 64 Raised platforms were constructed in different villages by which significant impact of housing management was observed on mortality and morbidity of goats.

Regular follow up and monitoring was done by KVK scientists to solve problems of farmers while starting their own enterprise. The groups were nurtured, guided and encouraged to grow and flourish as a model of agri-enterprise.

Development of Agroforestry model: Agroforestry model was developed around the field of each farmer in the village for boosting production of foliage to be used as biomass in local resource based organic farming.

25200 nos of Tephrosia, Subabool plants were planted along the border of fields.

### D.9. Mustard Promotion in Rice Fallow Area

A Front Line Demonstration programme on mustard was conducted at Baridih village of Bero block in collaboration with ICAR-DRMR, Bharatpur in 100 acre area. The main objective of the project was to improve tribal farmer's growing practices by undertaking capacity building programmes for the tribal farmers of Ranchi district. The ultimate goal is to increase rapeseed-mustard production in the area to alleviate poverty of the scheduled tribes of the district.

### Impact of the programme

Previously mustard was taken only as an intercrop with potato and other vegetable in the village. Under this project new high yielding variety Pusa Mustard 30 was introduced. 100 farmers of the village had cultivated mustard as a sole crop for the first time. After this practice the yield increased by 30 % which is a significant achievement not only for income generation but also for nutritional security.



Low Cost Organic Farming System & Lift Irrigation (Sponsored by ASPEE FOUNDATION)

Keeping in view the adverse effect of conventional farming with chemical inputs on land and environment, Divyayan KVK promoting organic cultivation practices in six villages of Angara block of Ranchi district namely Dhurleta, Budhakocha, Gundalitoli, Simratoli, Piprabera, Nagrabera and five villages of Nawagarh panchayat in collaboration with different govt. agencies. In order to extend its technologies of organic farming KVK has recognized many other villages of Ranchi district also. There is one such village named Soba, in Burmu block of Ranchi district. Rice based Rainfed agriculture has been predominant here due to limited irrigation sources. Most of the cultivable land remains fallow in Rabi season. Land situation is also suitable and farmers are very keen to make this village a leading organic vegetable grower. Despite the scarcity of water some farmers are growing vegetables organically with the help of water conservation techniques and their own irrigation means.



- 1. To maximize crop production in the target area ensuring round the year vegetable production through assured irrigation.
- 2. To develop a model organic cluster in target village.
- 3. To promote 'Low-Cost Local Resource Based Organic Farming' in the target area and ultimately the whole village through trainings and demonstrations.
- 4. Demonstration of multi-tier Maize Fodder and Azolla Production through Hydroponic System for animals which are essential for organic farming.
- 5. To bring significant change in socio-economic status of farmers.

### **D11. Khari of Paddy Minikit Demonstration** Through ICAR- National Rice Research Institute, Cuttack, Odisha

Rice is a major cereal crop of the district. Zinc malnutrition is a major issue in district and as well as whole country where polished rice is a staple food. According to World Health Organization, zinc deficiency is the fifth important factor for illness and diseases in developing countries. Imbalanced supply of nutrients and micro nutrients leads to their deficiency or accumulation affecting the human metabolism. Zinc deficiency causes diarrhea, respiratory diseases and is also associated with poor growth, loss of appetite, skin lesions, impaired taste acuity, delayed wound healing, hypogonadism, delayed sexual maturation, and impaired immune response.

So a demonstration of bio-fortified varieties of paddy seed was conducted at Dhurleta and Budhakocha villages under Angara Block of Ranchi district to assess the performance of these seed in the agro climatic condition of Ranchi district. Performance was assessed on different factors like yield, biotic/abiotic resistance, grain quality, farmers' acceptability etc.

The findings of above demonstration are as given below:

Based on the above findings it was concluded that among all the four varieties, biofortified variey CR Dhan 315 had maximum yield followed by CR Dhan 310 where as CR Dhan 311 and Naveen had at par result. As far as duration of maturity is concerned, Bio-fortified variety 311 took minimum days(118 days) to mature and this variety will be best suited in Rice-wheat or Rice-chickpea/mustard cropping system in the district. The bio-fortified rice varieties CR Dhan 315 had taken maximum days to attain maturity and may be recommended for low land areas of the district as it showed maximum yield. Taste of cooked rice of biofortified varieties was good in comparison to Naveen variety.

### D12. Workshops, Seminars and other Awareness Programmes

Divyayan Krishi Vigyan Kendra, Ramkrishna Misssion Ashrama, Morabadi, Ranchi organised a campaign on "Nutri- Garden and Tree Plantation" to mark as a run—up of the International Year of Millets 2023 under Azadi Ka Amrit Mahotsav, celebrating 75 years of India's Independence. The program was organised in joint collaboration with Divyayan Krishi Vigyan Kendra, Indian Farmer's Fertilizer Cooperative Limited (IFFCO), Ranchi and Krishak Bharati Cooperative Limited (KRIBHCO), Ranchi. The program was started with formal illumination of lamp and Vedic Mantrochar by the chief guest. The chief guest of the program was Shri Samari Lal, MLA of Kanke block, Ranchi. The program was chaired by Swami Bhaveshanada, secretary of Divyayan krishi Vigyan Kendra, Ramkrishna Mission Ashrama, Ranchi who delivered welcome speech. Vigilance week was observed from 26th October to 1st November,2021 with the objective of generating awareness in public at large about all the ill effects of corruption and to uphold highest standards of honesty, transparency & integrity by adopting integrity pledge of the central vigilance commission. This year the main focus of the programme was "Independent India @75:self reliance with integrity". A series of programmes consisting of displaying of banner, organising awareness camp, integrity pledge etc were conducted to mark this event.

#### **Food and Nutrition Programme**

Food and Nutrition program was organised for the farmers under "Azadi ka Amrit Mahotsav" in the auditorium of Divyayan Krishi Vigyan Kendra, Ramkrishna Mission Ashrama, Morabadi, Ranchi on 26th August 2021. Dr. Mahto motivated the farmers for goatery and poultry. Dr. Garima Mishra, Subject Matter Specialist, Home Science discussed about Health and Nutrition of farmers. She discussed about the importance of balance diet to combat malnutrition among children and women in detail.

After this, broadcasting of the program organized by Indian Council of Agricultural Research New Delhi was done to the framers in which Shri Narendra Singh Tomar, Union Agriculture Minister, and Shri Kailash Choudhary, Minister of State for Agriculture and Farmers' Welfare talked about different programmes run by government to ensure the nutritional and food security of the farmers. A total of 144 women participated in this programme of which 102 women were Anganwadi Workers. During the entire programme vegetable seed kit and guava plants were distributed among all the Anganwadi workers provided by IFFCO, Ranchi for the promotion of Nutri- Garden.

This Ashrama has been rendering health care service through a Charitable Dispensary and Mobile Dispensary. Both the units have a pool of 17 specialist doctors of various ailment areas like cardiology, gynaecology, pediatrics, skin and VD, orthopaedics, ophthalmology, dentistry etc, who offer their honorary services on regular basis.

### **Charitable Dispensary**

The Charitable Dispensary, established in the Ashrama campus, mainly caters to the needs of the poor and other needy people of Ranchi city. A good number of latest equipments like ECG machine, Suction machine(ENT), Dental Chair, Computerized Refraction machines etc. have been installed for better diagnosis of the patients.

### Mobile Dispensary (Partially sponsored by Ministry of Tribal Affairs, Govt. of India)

It runs through the remote villages of Ranchi district to provide health care service to the villagers. Weekly and special medical camps are organised through this unit. During the year 2021-22 the villages covered under the weekly medical camps programme mainly belonged to Angara and Burmu Blocks of Ranchi and Karra Block of Khunti District as given below.

# Naren Eye Care and Vivekananda Eye Camp Programme Sponsored by Blind Foundation for India, USA

This Ashrama, in collaboration with Blind Foundation for India, USA, has been executing Naren Eye Care (For Children) and Vivekananda Eye Camp Programme (Cataract detection and operation for adult) since 2010 for providing eye care service to the rural children and adult deprived of all types of medical facilities. Generally the headmasters of respective schools are contacted through our volunteers of Vivekandna Seva Sangh to fix the date of the camp. Then in the camp, eye check-up is done followed by a small awareness meeting on the "Proper Care of Eye". Once the children are identified with problem in eye sight they are provided with spectacles in the next camp. Children are also provided with medicines like vitamin-A, deworming tablets, eye drop etc. The cataract operation camps are also organised for the elderly people. After the identification of cataract, proper medical tests are done before cataract surgery.

To execute this programme successfully, this Ashrama has a collaboration with Niramaya Hospital, Ranchi, which bore all the operation and post operation costs. The performance record of this programme is as given below:



## **F. Integrated Education**

(Formal, Vocational and Moral) Rural Education, NIOS, ASSK, Gurukul, Annual Competition, **GAP**, Library



### **Rural Education:**

The present education system aims at a white collar job and it is leading towards poverty and unemployment. It is a system that does not provide scope of development of creativity and free thinking power in children. It takes away a farmer's son or daughter away from cultivation, production and self-reliance. Children from the very beginning feel study a burden, full of tension and heavy books give rise to nervousness. Thus an entirely new approach is required. The delivery system needed to be altered drastically. Changes in strategy, i.e. devising altogether new delivery mechanism, is the need of the hour. A model is required that may make the children feel study as easy and burden free, tempt them to learn and put them into a search mode & search for the new things.

In this regard this Ashrama have been assisting **primary schools and Akhandananda Shiksha and Sanskar Kendras and Gurukula Centres** run by NGOs and Vivekananda Seva Sanghas formed by our ex-trainees at Angara, Burmu, Bero, Mandar, Tamar Blocks under Ranchi District and Murhu Block under Khunti Districts.

A unique technique of teaching has been developed which includes games, models, demonstration, discussions, charts, maps as learning implements vis-a-vis books. Creativity development is brought through sketches, paintings, model making and use of geometry box.

Under unique teaching technique students were guided to play special types of games aimed at enhancing the power of concentration, memory, alertness and smartness leading to the personality development. For integrated development of the children special classes are conducted for Yoga, meditation, PT and marching practices.

Children are taken on excursion to get them exposed to the nature. They are made familiar with trees, seeds and crops. They are made to recognize every component of the nature and are explained how we are related to the nature. Children are made aware of Health & Hygiene. Periodical medical check-ups are arranged.

Besides the regular primary schools, most of our **Akhandananda Shiksha and Sanskar Kendras** are conducting evening coaching classes in their respective villages. Besides the regular course, value education classes are also conducted in these coaching centres to inculcate the feelings that man is potentially divine and religion is the manifestation of the divinity in man. Emphasis is given on cultivation of goodness - 'Be good and help others to be good'.

But during the reporting period, the activities of these centres became limited due to Covid-19 pandemic. Regular classes could not be held, however Vivekananda Seva Sangha members made every effort to keep up the activities which have been taught to the students in their home itself.

### Maa Sarada Gurkul at Chipibandihi, Tamar - Sponsored by Soul Divine

Since the inception of 'Divyayan' the rural development wing in the year 1969, this ashrama is tiring hard for the all-round development of the tribal people in the remote villages of Ranchi and its adjoining area. But in the year 1990, with the financial assistance from District administration first step was taken to save the primitive tribes mainly dwelling in the forest of Tamar Block of Ranchi by constructing a Community Hall

and 14 Indira Aawas Yojana Houses for Birhor primitive tribes at Chipibandhdih village. Then in year 2003, 70 dwelling units called Birsa Aawas were constructed at Chipibandhdih, Basukocha and Budhadih under same Tamar Block. All through these years different rural development activities were carried out as these Ashram does for other tribal villages. But, it was felt in the year 2015, despite our all effort this Ashrama could not notice any permanent and satisfactory development in these primitive tribes.

In the year 2015 a group of noble hearted young Indians residing in USA along with few of their friends residing in India under the name 'Soul Divine' came forward to help this Ashrama provide elementary education and nutritious food the children with an objective to rectify the budding generation for a better future generation. A few student were sent to Adyapith, Kolkata to provide quality education. But after some time, children came back and were not ready to return to Adyapith, Kolkata.

Hence it was strongly felt that children needed to be educated and groomed at their own village by constructing a hostel and classrooms for them. With the financial assistance of 'Soul Divine Group', the same community hall constructed in the year 1990 was renovated and was given the name Maa Sarada Gukul. Children from class 3 to 5 of this Primitive Tribe has been enrolled in this Gurukul. They are given moral and physical education by prayer, Swadesh Mantra of Swami Vivekananda, practice of Yoga etc. They are given school education by admitting them in nearby Government school. It is the aim of this Gurukul to make children educationally more qualified so that they can get admission in better schools like Jawahar Navodaya Vidyalaya: Kasturba Gandhi Vidyalaya: Eklavya Model Residential School, Salgadih, Tamar (Ranchi): Netarhat Awasiya Vidyalaya, Latehar: Ramakrishna Mission, Jamshedpur: Vivekananda Central School, Hazaribagh etc.

The purpose of this Gurukul is to make children morally, physically and educationally fit to Cope up with current educational development so that their entire community can be uplifted and saved from depletion.

### **National Institute of Open Schooling:**

Ramakrishna Mission Ashrama, Divyayan Krishi Vigyan Kendra, Morabadi, Ranchi, successfully continued its endeavour for the upliftment of rural youth in the field of sustainable education through synergy of formal education, multi-skill vocational education with moral education to make the youth self- reliant as envisaged by Swami Vivekananda.

Despite massive expansion of the education system in the country, a large number of adolescents and youths, particularly from the economically weaker sections and in rural areas, are not able to acquire school education. In this backdrop, Ramakrishna Mission Ashrama, during extensive rural development work, realised that integrating vocational education at Divyayan with school education with the help of National Institute of Open Schooling (NIOS) can provide necessary employability skill and at the same time, underprivileged and poor rural youths particularly tribal, can get the opportunity for higher education in college and University. That innovative and noble approach yields wonderful result.

With a motto, 'to educate every rural youth' We have initiated distant education through NIOS and since the year 2001, Ramakrishna Mission Ashrama, Ranchi, is working as an accredited Institute of NIOS, running the courses of: Open Basic Education (OBE) for the children up to class eight; Secondary and Senior Secondary and Vocational courses. So far 2318 children out of 2421 have passed eighth standard; 104 out of 262 have passed vocational courses; 939 out of 1821 have cleared Secondary and 870 out of 1821 have cleared Senior Secondary courses.

During the reporting year 46 students in secondary,101 in senior secondary and 4 in vocational courses have been enrolled.

To sustain this approach, we have developed a mechanism that, rural youths, particularly school drop-outs who have come for undertaking vocational training at Divyayan for long duration course, are given the opportunity for secondary and senior secondary courses of NIOS along with multiskilled vocational courses of Divyayan and also of NIOS, free of cost. After successful completion, they may further join different diplomas/degrees/certificate courses offered by Ramakrishna Mission Vivekananda Education and Research Institute (RKMVERI), in the Faculty of Agriculture Rural and Tribal Development (ARTD), Morabadi, Ranchi, through formal procedure. As of now, twenty-two (22) rural youths who took training at Divyayan, have completed degree. Out of which 12 graduates and 10 master degree from RKMVERI and all of them are well established in different institutions.

This is really amazing that those boys, who were tending animals and helping their parents in livelihood and got education in their generation only, are now working as executives in different organizations. Seeing the significant and incredible success in this approach, we have decided to document their success-stories as an example and for an eye-opener to all the stake-holders of rural development particularly in the field of education.

### Akhandananda Shiksha and Sanskar Kendra (ASSK)

The message of Sri Ramakrishna and Swami Vivekananda inspired Swami Akhandananda (direct disciple of Sri Ramakrishna) to begin rural development work much before the Ramakrishna Mission came into existence. Swami Akhandananda as a wondering monk while in Khetri (Rajasthan) during 1894, he went from door to door all along to bring awareness in the people about the utility of the education and it was because of his efforts that the number of student in the Khetri Rajya, English School rose from 80 to 200. Under his inspiration, the Maharaja of Khetri arranged for the education of the Golas (illiterate slaves) and also set up a permanent education department to open schools in the villages.

Taking the inspiration from the above, this Morabadi centre of Ramakrishna Mission Ashrama launched an ambitious project on the holy occasion of 150th Birth Anniversary of Swami Akhandananda on 12th October 2015 named as Akhandananda Shiksha and Sanskar Kendra in Ranchi district.

The objective of this project is to integrate academic, vocational and moral education for the children in the villages of our operational area for man-making and character building education as envisaged by Swami Vivekananda.

Under this project, the children of class 5 are prepared to equip themselves for the entrance exam for Navoday Vidyalaya, Kasturba Kanya Vidyalaya, Ekalavya Vidyalaya etc. Recently in March 2022, 15 students gave entrance exam for Vivekananda High School, Chenab Road, Jamshedpur and two students were selected to enter for class 7.

Total Kendras in this project are 38 in Ranchi district. It is spread through out 5 blocks of Ranchi district like Angara(32), Burmu (3), Bero (1), Tamar (1), Kanke (1).

Total students in all 38 centres are 1618 (735 boys and 839 girls). In class 0-2, there are 525 students, in class 3-5 there are 514 students, in class 6-8, total students are 417, and in class 9 & above total students are 514.

Classes are taken on all the days except Sunday. Students are taught Yoga, game, Personal Hygiene, cleanliness, Prayer, Swadesh Mantra, chanting from 4:00 PM to 6:00 PM and classes of text book like Math, Science, English, Hindi, Social Study, & General Knowledge of school curriculum are taken from 6:00 PM to 8:00 PM.

Students are given special training on Leadership once in a year. Quiz competition 2021 based on ideas and ideals of Swami Vivekananda was organized for the all students under this project. Students were taken on educational tour to Birsa Jaivik Udhyan, Ormanjhi, Ranchi district during the year of 2021.

### 51st Annual Competitions - 2021

Every year Annual competition is organized in the Month of July. Total participants online & offline were about 51,000. After holding the competition at School level, winners were given a chance to participate in District level competition, which was organized by District level committee. Winners of District level competition participated in state level competition.



### GRSE, AICL and FCRA Sponsored Gadadhar Abhyudaya Prakalpa

This project was conducted for the integrated development of the 497 children belonging to economically backward families. It was mainly aimed at developing physical, mental and intellectual strength of the children. The project was carried out at 9 locations namely Kuturloba, Badri, Getalsud, Bandhuadih, Mungadih, Dublabera under Angara Block and Chiroundi, Morabadi of Ranchi District and Maliyada of Khunit Block.

To improve the health of the children, they were provided with nutritive food like milk (250 ml. to each per day), gram, corn flakes, flattened rice, dalia, ground nut, pea etc.

To inculcate better hygienic practice, toiletries like tooth paste, tooth brush, coconut oil, soaps were provided on regular basis to the beneficiaries .

The basic training on cleanliness, awareness about general health and hygiene was given to the children by highly educated supervisors and mentors who are experts in these areas. They visited the unit weekly.

Value education session of 30 minutes was conducted through pictorial moral storybooks at least once in a week by the teacher and sometimes by the supervisors and mentors.

The children were made to grow the habit of planting flower, vegetables etc. Responsibilities were distributed among the children. They worked in team to clean the classroom and surroundings etc.

Children's height and weight were monitored periodically. They were not only provided with iron supplements and protein rich diet, but de-worming was also done at every three months interval by administering Albendazole or Mebendazole.

For development of moral and aesthetic value, classes on Vedic and Gita chanting along with meditation,

yoga, music and drama were also organised as an integral part of the programme. Special movies on moral values were also shown occasionally.

### Library

This static library has a suitable building of 4000 sq. feet (approx). It has 23692 books as on 31.3.2022 to cater to the needs of all ages. It is a unique and only free public library, in this part of the city and provides its services mainly to school and college going students and to those who prepare for the various competitive examinations. This library is very popular among students of Ranchi University, Ramakrishna Mission Vivekananda Educational and Research Institute and research scholars because of it's quiet environment and availability of large spectrum of reading material on wide and varied subjects. The library was visited by 20502 readers during 2021-22 in spite of the fact that library remain closed for almost 2 months due to lockdown imposed by goverment to contain the corona virus.

Many students, who desire to compete in different examinations, prepare themselves with the help of this library and use it as a study centre. A large number of such students are getting success in their efforts with the reading facilities they get from this library.

### About The University:

Ramakrishna Mission Vivekananda Educational and Research Institute (formerly known as Ramakrishna Mission Vivekananda University) is the first step in actualization of Swami Vivekananda's vision that Belur Math would develop into an all-round University. It was declared by Government of India through its Ministry of Human Resource Development on the advice of University Grants Commission as an institution deemed-to-be-university under Section 3 of UGC Act, 1956 by a Gazette Notification No. F.9-54/2004-U.3 dated 5 January 2005. The University was formally inaugurated by the Most Revered Swami Gahanananda ji Maharaj,President of Ramarishna Math and Mission on 4 July 2005, the sacred day of mahasamadhi (passing way) of Swami Vivekananda. With the asset of vast experiences of the Ramakrishna Mission Ashrama, Morabadi for more than eight decades and Divyayan Krishi Vigyan Kendra (KVK) for more than three decades, Ramakrishna Mission Vivekananda Educational and Research Institute, Belur Math decided to establish a faculty centre for 'Integrated Rural & Tribal Development and Management (IRTDM)' at Morabadi, Ranchi, Jharkhand. The appeal was accepted and approval was given to this centre as an 'Offcampus Faculty Centre' by the University Grant Commission (UGC) after an inspection of six members team from 29 to 30 June 2006, vide notification No. F.6-96/2004(CPP-I) dated 3 July 2006. In 2019, faculty of ARTD has been restructured into two independent divisions for academic and administrative clarity.





### L. An Appeal

This Ashrama was established in the year 1927 by Srimat Swami Vishuddhananda ji, the direct disciple of Holy Mother Sarada Devi, and the 8th President of Ramakrishna Order. In early sixties, when the adjoining districts to Ranchi were in the grip of severe drought, this Ashrama organized distress relief operation. During the relief work, it was strongly felt that unless the resource-poor and illiterate farmers are trained in need-based agricultural technology supported by group action, they would never be able to counter similar adverse conditions in future. In order to fulfill the above requirements a novel integrated rural development model was conceived and a free residential institute was launched by this centre in 1969 under the name 'Divyayan' for imparting training to village youths, particularly Tribals, in scientific agriculture, dairy, poultry, bee-keeping, horticulture, farm machinery, carpentry, welding, electrician, pump repairing, etc. and social service. The institute was recognized as Krishi Viyan Kendra in the year 1977. As a mark of appreciation for its objectives and method of imparting training right from its inception, it has been awarded as the best KVK amongst nearly 540 KVKs of the country for the year 1997-98 and as the best KVK in the Zone-IV for the year 2015-16. It has again received best KVK award for the year 2016-17, 2018-19 amongst nearly 650 KVKs of the country. It is not gain saying the fact that Divyayan (meaning Divine Way) has become verily the temple for the worship of God in man.

The objectives of the training programme are to make the village youths self reliant and break free themselves from the shackles of poverty. After acquiring the skill, it is expected that they will be able to establish small enterprises related to agriculture and allied trades by using the available local resources. In this way, they will be employing themselves and may create jobs for others too.

The residential training programmes for the tribals, as mentioned above, are mainly sponsored by the Ministry of Tribal Welfare(MTW), Govt. of India (GOI) for 80 trainees per year. But the fund sanctioned and released by the MTW, GOI for these training programmes is too meagre to meet the expenses over the trainees' boarding and food , Salary for the Trainers, Administrative staffs, other employees and establishment. As such we solely depend on the donations from our benevolent donors to meet the essential extra expenditure to keep up this training programmes for the tribal.
