





The training of 2011 rural youth and farmers this year stands as a testament to this enduring mission. Significant infrastructural advancements—including the installation of a 93 KWP solar plant, a honey processing unit, a millet processing facility, and a state-of-the-art honey testing laboratory—have further strengthened our capacity to serve tribal youth and enhance local livelihoods

Education remains the cornerstone of our development strategy. Through Akhandananda Shiksha and Sanskar Kendras, Gadadhar Abhyudaya Prakalpa(GAP), Vivekananda Abhyudaya Prakalpa(VAP), Maa Sarada Gurukul, and the faculty centre of Ramakrishna Mission Vivekananda Educational Research Institute (RKMVERI), we have nurtured learners from KG to Ph.D., reaching over 1689 students across 47 centres and 544 students through higher education programs. Our library, visited by over 34,000 individuals, continues to be a beacon of knowledge and inspiration.

The development of organic villages under Angara Block, the outreach of Divyayan Krishi Vigyan Kendra and our collaboration with academic institutions for Rural Agricultural Work Experience(RAWE) programs reflect our integrated approach to farming and education. In health care, our dispensary and mobile units served over 16,000 patients, reaffirming our commitment to accessible and compassionate medical services.

We also remain devoted to preserving the rich cultural heritage of rural communities, recognizing it as a vital source of strength and identity.

This report is not merely a record of activities—it is a reflection of the collective spirit, dedication, and love of our monks, staff, volunteers, devotees, and supporters. We offer our heartfelt gratitude to all who have walked with us on this path of service.



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## A. About Us

#### Ramakrishna Math & Ramakrishna Mission



**Belur Math** 

The twin organisations Ramakrishna Math & Ramakrishna Mission (having branches all over India as well as in other parts of the World) bearing the name of Sri Ramakrishna, the prophet of harmony of all religions, were started by Swami Vivekanandain May 1897.

The Math was registered as a Trust in 1901 and the Mission was duly registered in 1909 under Society Registration Act XXI of 1860 (Reg. No. 1971/3 of 1909-10).

At present the Ramakrishna Order has 283 centres including 68 outside India (as on 31st March, 2024). There are 57 sub-centres (25 within India, 32 outside India) under different centres.

These branches are engaged in diverse activities in the field of medical, educational, cultural, social, spiritual, rural and tribal upliftment, relief and rehabilitation (Disaster Management).

#### Ramakrishna Mission Ashrama, Morabadi, Ranchi

Swami Vivekananda had a vision to establish a technical school and gradually a centre in the tribal area of Chotanagpur where new ways of food production would be discovered. In this context he mentioned that in central India, near Hazaribagh and such other districts of the region of Jharkhand (then a part of Bihar), a big plot of land would have to be acquired for the purpose.

The vision of Swami Vivekananda took shape with the establishment of an Ashrama at Ranchi in

1927 by Srimat Swami Vishuddhananda, the direct disciple of Holy Mother Sarada Devi, and the 8th President of Ramakrishna Order. This Ashrama campus has been sanctified by the visit of Swami Subodhanandaji Maharaj, a direct disciple of Sri Ramakrishna devin the year 1928.

#### Divyayan Krishi Vigyan Kendra, Ranchi

In early sixties, when Ranchi and its adjoining districts were in the grip of severe drought, Ramakrishna Mission Ashrama, Morabadi, organised a relief work for the distressed poor. During that period it was strongly realized that unless the poor and illiterate farmers are trained in need based agriculture and allied technologies supported by group action, they can not be made self-reliant and also would never be able to counter similar adverse condition in future. In order to fulfill the above requirements 'Divyayan'(meaning Divine Way), a novel integrated rural development model, intended to worship God in man, was conceived and finally launched by this centre in 1969 as a residential training centre for tribal and rural youth in agriculture and related activities, Then in the year 1977, Divyayan was recognized by the Indian Council of Agricultural Research (ICAR) as a Krishi Vigyan Kendra (KVK) in 1977.

Divyayan KVK got the Best KVK Award of ICAR, New Delhi at National Level, for the period 1996-97 and 2016-17 and Zonal Level during the period 2016-17. It has been once again awarded as the best KVK at national level for the year 2019-20 by the famous outlook group. NITI Aayog has also placed Divyayan KVK in the 'A' Category.

# **B.** Objectives

Motto: The motto of the Ashrama, as formulated by Swami Vivekananda, is "Atmano Mokshartham Jagad Hitaya Cha", "For one's own salvation and for the welfare of the world".

The Ashrama has adopted six objectives for integrated development of the rural tribal people as follows

- ♦ Economic ♦ Social ♦ Health Related
- ♦ Educational ♦ Cultural ♦ Spiritual
- (a) The economic objective is achieved through training imparted to the grass root level young farmers and school drop-outs, especially belonging to the backward section of rural community, in modern technology as applicable to the field of agriculture and allied areas for increasing per unit land area per family output and thus helping the people become self reliant.
- (b) The social objective is carried out by imbibing the spirit of community living, developing sense of cooperation, acquiring youth leadership qualities, instilling group action and self-confidence with a view to promote national integration at all levels.
- (c) The health care objective is accomplished by organising weekly medical camps, special medical camps, health awareness camps, total sanitation and drinking water awareness, creating and educating the people for participating in vaccination programmes, providing health care to the last person of the rural area.
- (d)The educational objective is achieved by guiding the local youths for establishing primary schools, enrolling the drop outs in National Institute of Open Schooling and through Diploma, Graduate and Post graduate teaching programmes of Ramakrishna Mission Vivekananda Educational and Research Institute (RKMVERI).
- (e) The cultural objective is achieved by promoting and encouraging local culture based on the Indian ancient culture and traditions.
- (f) The spiritual objective is achieved by spreading the doctrine of oneness of all souls, toleration and acceptance of all faiths/religions and fostering universal brotherhood, non-sectarian approach and spiritual values in daily life to achieve the highest purpose of life.



## C. The Infrastructure

Divyayan KVK, already having excellent basic facilities for farmers & rural youth to update their knowledge & skill through residential training programmes, was further developed (i)during the year 2009-2010 with construction of a new Conference Hall and a Mist Chamber for hardening plants produced by the Tissue Culture Laboratory; (ii) during the year 2013-14, with construction of a 100-bed Farmers' Hostel under the name of Swami Vivekananda Kisan Chhatravas; (iii) during 2015-16 with the renovation of Permanent Exhibition on Swami Vivekananda's Life and Message (iv)during 2016-17 with the establishment of 10 KV solar grid with solar panel & solar water heater and creating water harvesting structures , (v) during 2017-18 by starting construction of farm boundary and road within the campus, development of brick soled paddock and during 2018-19, establishing 25 KV solar grid with solar panel, 3 storey Poultry Demonstration unit and Twin Bio Gas Plants, completing excavation of 3 new ponds, renovation of all old ponds, construction of 2 new wells and Farm boundary road , multi layer azolla production unit (2022-23), Rishi Parasar Lquid manure production unit(2023-24)

**During the financial year 2024–25**, Divyayan Krishi Vigyan Kendra underwent a significant infrastructural transformation aimed at enhancing rural capacity building and agricultural entrepreneurship. The highlight of this transformation was the construction of a state-of-the-art, four-storeyed Birsa Munda Bhawan—a dedicated Tribal Youth Training Centre that houses demonstration units and class rooms.

#### **Key Infrastructural Developments**

- 1. Birsa Munda Bhawan: A Hub for Innovation and Skill Building Constructed as a modern four-storeyed complex, Birsa Munda Bhawan serves as a dynamic training and demonstration centre for tribal youth. It provides hands-on exposure to modern agro-processing technologies and value addition techniques, fostering both employment and entrepreneurship.
- 2. Honey Processing Unit (NBHM Project) A fully-equipped honey processing plant with a processing capacity of 200 kg per 8 hours has been established under the National Beekeeping and Honey Mission (NBHM). This unit enables efficient honey extraction, purification, and packaging, aimed at improving the livelihood of local beekeepers and honey producers.
- 3. Food Processing Demonstration Unit:- ICAR-Indian Institute of Millets Research (IIMR) project, this facility houses cutting-edge machinery and tools, including:
  - o Huller Machine o Wet Grinder & Dry Grinder o Sugar Grinder o Farsan Machine
  - o Baking Oven o Sealing and Packaging Machines

This unit empowers rural youth and SHGs to engage in food product development, value addition, and sustainable agribusiness initiatives.

- 4. On-Grid Solar Energy System (CSR Initiative by CCL) As part of the Corporate Social Responsibility (CSR) initiative by Central Coalfields Limited (CCL), a 93.96 KWP on-grid solar system has been installed. This not only reduces the centre's carbon footprint but also ensures uninterrupted power supply to all technical units.
- 5. State-of-the-Art Honey Testing Laboratory A world-class laboratory dedicated to honey quality testing and standardization has been set up, equipped with:
- Atomic Absorption Spectrophotometer, HPLC (High-Performance Liquid Chromatography) System, Double Beam UV-VIS Spectrophotometer, Microcontroller-Based pH System, Total Dissolved Solids (TDS) Meter







# **D.1 Training**

During 2024-25, the Ashrama continued its endeavors towards addressing the root causes of unemployment in rural tribal villages, through its unique model of residential training programmes to build confidence in rural youths and enable them to launch their own enterprises. There are three types of training programmes, which are offered by Divyayan KVK viz. On-campus, Offcampus specialized courses and NIOS linked multi skill training curriculum with value education at their core.

All these training programmes are mainly meant for tribal youths with free board and lodging facility sponsored partially by the Ministry of Tribal Affairs (MoTA), Govt. of India; Deptt. of Welfare, Govt. of Jharkhand; Indian Council of Agricultural Research (ICAR) through KVK and others.

#### Training Programmes for Rural Youth in Agriculture and Allied Trade (On-campus)

Objective of this training programme is to make the trainee self reliant by launching his own enterprise. Hence every trainee needs to undergo extensive practical training. Every effort is made to change the mind set of the trainees and to make them sincere, disciplined and co-operative. Emphasis is also given on developing managerial skills and they are being exposed to real life circumstances to empower them to face any eventuality that may arise during the running of their own enterprises. Training is given in different trades viz. Bee-keeper, Lac Producer, Mali Training/Supervisor, Mushroom Producer, Soil Health Management, Fisheries, Organic Grower, Poultry, Dairy, Pump Repairing, Electrician, Carpentry and Welding. These courses are of 1.5 month, 3 months, and 6 months duration depending upon the trade. During the reporting period (2024-25), **2011** trainees were provided training in different trades including short duration courses.

# Training Programme on Integrated Farming System for Practicing Farmers and Farm Women (Off-campus)

Training programmes on "Integrated Farming" of 45-days duration are conducted in villages for practicing farmers and farm women as they are unable to attend the long duration residential

training programme due to lack of time and their engagement in farming. These training programmes are conducted on different thematic areas like Bee Keeping, lac production, mushroom production etc. During the reporting period (2024-25), **489** trainees were trained in **12** batches.

#### **Sponsored Training Programme**

Sponsored training programmes are conducted for different participants sponsored by different govt. and non-govt. organisations. These custom made courses are of 3-days, 5 days, 10days and 15 days duration.

#### **Skill Training Programme Under KVK**

These training programmes are mainly for the practicing farmers and rural youth which are conducted under skill development programme of Krishi Vigyan Kendra.

This unit is equipped with T.V., DVD/CD players, multimedia projector, CDs and DVDs, to conduct shows on various aspects of rural development, agricultural production and spirituality. ## D.2.c Sri Ramakrishna Annual Regional and Central Kisan Melas

Like every year this year the Ashrama has conducted 3 Regional Kisan Melas based on the theme 'Prakritik, Sansadhan Prabandhan Dwara Aay, Srijan'. The Regional Kisan Melas were organised in the villages Bagda under Kanke Block, Lamkana under Bero Block and Sirka Pasrabera under Murhu Block. All the fairs were able to attract a good number of participation of farmers from different villages of the same Block. #### 46th Sri Ramakrishna Central Kisan Mela 2024-25

For promoting natural farming and emerging new technologies into the farming system, a two-day Central Kisan Mela (30th January to 31st January was organized at Getalsud Farm of Angara Block in Ranchi District by the joint collaboration of Divyayan Krishi Vigyan Kendra (DKVK) Ramakrishna Mission Aashram, RKMVERI, and Vivekananda Seva Sangha of Angara Block. The theme of the Mela was "Prakritik Sansadhan Prabandhan Dwara Aay, Srijan". The technology demonstrated in Mela was mainly focused on Natural farming, fruits and vegetable cultivation based on natural farming, food processing of indigenous crop, indigenous cow and goat farming etc. The Mela was mainly sponsored by National Bank for agriculture and Rural Development (NABARD) and SCSP project under Divyayan Krishi Vigyan Kendra, Ranchi and Agriculture Technology Management Agency (ATMA), Ranchi. Ministry of Tribal Affairs (MoTA).

#### Objectives of the farmers' fair:

- 1. To bring awareness among the farmer about the importance of the natural farming system and millet crops.
- 2. To introduce farmers with new technologies of integrated agriculture.
- 3. To popularize natural farming and boost confidence among the farmer in adopting natural farming for the sake of environment and health without losing productivity.
- 4. To demonstrate low cost implements to reduce drudgery and increase agricultural productivity.
- 5. To provide an opportunity for exchange of ideas/ technologies/ innovation among farmers and various stake holders.
- 6. To send a message among the rural mass that integrated watershed approach is the best way to bring development in the rural area.
- 7. To inform the farmers about the role of banks in agriculture.

To meet the above objectives different types of extension aids like stalls, models, live demonstrations, audio-visual shows, charts and posters were developed and Kisan Gosthis organized during Mela. All the events and shows were conducted in local/Hindi language. Scientists from the different Agriculture

Universities and Research Stations were invited in Mela for the direct interaction with the farmers. Though the Mela was started to the farmers since 8:00 am on 30th January 2025 but it was formally inaugurated at 1:00 pm by the Chief guest smt Nisha Oraon, director panchayati raj, govt of Jharkhand and special guest Jila Parishad Adhyaksh Smt Nirmala Bhagat,.



**Crop and Animal Exhibition:** To encourage and to increase the participation of the farmers' and for horizontal dissemination of technology the farmers were informed in prior to bring their own produce as exhibits and will awarded for the best produce. 429crops brought by farmers like vegetables, fruits, handcrafts, lac, and mushroom were of good quality. 90 farmers were given prizes for their best exhibits.

**Stalls and Live models:** 45 stalls from various research institutes, private seed and fertilizer companies, agricultural implements companies etc. were there besides the stalls of Divyayan Krisi Vigyan Kendra, Ramkrishna Mission Vivekananda Educational Research & Institute and other departments of Ashrama. Krishi Vigyan Kendra put their stall on "Natural resource management" which was based on sub-theme Income generation through Natural Resource Management. Different technology was demonstrated under this theme like land levelling, step farming, Multi-cropping, organic multilayer orchard, Integrated pond system, nursery rearing, Enriched composting, water management, las cultivation, bee keeping, chemical free farming of paddy, fodder maize, drip irrigation, azola cultivation.

Income generation through value addition of indigenous cereals, millets, pulses, oilseeds, fruits and vegetables crop of Jharkhand by using traditional method of food processing and Food pyramid was also demonstrated to make farmer aware of the local resources for different nutrient, balance diet and its health benefits.

**Kisan Gosthi:** Kisan goshti were organized on each day of Mela and discussion were held on different subjects of farmer's interest like lac cultivation, crop production, vegetable farming, natural/organic cultivation, farm implements and dairy. The problems of different areas of agriculture and allied field raised by the farmers were directly addressed by the concern scientists. Scientist from various universities and research institutes and 500 farmers participated in the Kisan Gosthi

**Concluding session:** On the 2nd day of the Mela, a concluding session was held in which the chief guest of the mela was Dr. Kumar Tara Chand, Director Agriculture and Swami Bhaveshananda, Secretary Ramakrishna Mission Ashrama, were embellishing the Mela by giving their presence and jointly conclude the session.

Chief Guest appreciated the technology demonstrated by Divyayan KVK and other organisations. Secretary of Ramakrishna Mission Swami Bhaveshananda appealed to farmers for adopting natural

farming practices. Giving information about the organic farming Swami ji said that through natural farming farmers can improve their wealth as well as health.

On 18 June 2024, during the visit to Varanasi, Prime Minister, Shri Narendra Modi addressed the farmers and beneficiaries of the different welfare schemes being run by central government via video-conferencing. He also distributed certificates to more than 30,000 SHGs trained as Krishi Sakhis. The live telecast of this program was shown in the auditorium of Divyayan Krishi Vigyan Kendra, Ramakrishna Mission Ashrama, Morabadi, Ranchi. Here at Divyayan KVK, Ranchi, Krishi Sakhis were given away certificates.

Hon'ble PM released 109 Crop varieties developed by ICAR during a programme, held on 11th August 2024 at Bharat Ratna C. Subramaniam Auditorium, NASC Complex, New Delhi. Appropriate arrangements for webcast of Hon'ble PM's programme was made at Divyayan KVK, so that the farmers assembled at KVK could watch the live telecast/webcast of Hon'ble PM's programme, simultaneously.

Prime Minister Shri Narendra Modi released the 19th instalment of the Pradhan Mantri Kisan Samman Nidhi (PM-KISAN) scheme on 24th February, 2025 in Bhagalpur, Bihar. During the event over 9.8 crore farmers including 2.41 crore female farmers across the country were benefited.

With a view to augment the income of the Small and Marginal Farmers (SMFs), the PM-KISAN scheme aims to: Supplement the financial needs of the SMFs in procuring various inputs to ensure proper crop health and appropriate yields, commensurate with the anticipated farm income at the end of each crop cycle.

This would also protect them from falling in the clutches of moneylenders for meeting such expenses and ensure their continuance in the farming activities

All the programme was conducted in the auditorium of Ramakrishna Mission Ashrama, Morabadi in gracious presence of Mps and MLAs. They directly interacted with the beneficiaries of the different schemes and urged the participants to cover their fellow villagers under different welfare schemes of the govt. All the programmes were attended by on and average 180 participants. Farmer scientist interaction was held during all the programmes.

## D.2.e Kisan Gosthi, Adaptive Research (CFLD, FLD and OFT)

**Kisan Gosthi:** These are conducted to apprise the farmers about different technologies involved in production of different crops and to have direct interaction with farmers. This year **12** Kisan Gosthis were organized involving **2603** farmers.

#### Cluster Front Line Demonstration (CFLD) and Front Line Demonstration (FLD):

The field demonstration conducted under the close supervision of scientists is called Front Line Demonstration, as the technologies are demonstrated for the first time by the scientists themselves before being fed into the main extension system of the State Department of Agriculture. The main objective of CFLD/FLD is to demonstrate newly released crop production and different technologies and its management practices in the farmers' field under different agroclimatic region and farming situation. During 2024-25, CFLD and FLD programmes were conducted on **18** different crops/technologies/implements like paddy, wheat, niger, green gram, mustard, tomato etc. involving **2366** farmers. Feed back from the involved farmers have been properly collected and provided to respective research institutions.

### **D.2.g ICAR-ARYA Project**

# (Attracting and Retaining Youths in Agriculture)

ARYA project with financial support of ICAR, New Delhi was started in the year 2019. The main objective of the project was to reinstate rural youths to the farming system so that this dynamic work force can be positively re-engaged for improvement of livelihood. To fulfil the objective three enterprises namely goatery, lac Cultivation and Bee Keeping were chosen under the project.

# Summary of major activities which were undertaken during 2024-25 Goatery Enterprise:

- ♦ 1(One) Training programmes on scientific goat rearing was conducted involving 39 youth
- ♦ No. of Youths established (including restart of closed units) entrepreneurial units (No.) during the reporting period **07**
- No. of functional entrepreneurial units (No.) since the beginning of the project 117
- **Five** group of **20** farmers was formed.
- Net benefit per functional unit Rs.1,39,500/-.
- KVK provided critical support to each beneficiary for establishment of their enterprise.
- ♦ KVK distributed 8 nos. of feeder, 3 nos. of castector, 11000 nos. of vaccine in project village. 50 raised platforms for goats were constructed for same number of beneficiaries.

#### **Outcome:**

- ♦ At present **117** farmer families have developed a successful and profitable enterprise in goatery after KVK interventions like housing management with raised platform, breed improvement, regular vaccination and time to time providing of advisory services in project villages.
- ♦ Each beneficiary has maintained minimum 26 goats at this time.
- ♦ The mortality rate in goats which was 24 % in the beginning has decreased to 13 %.
- ♦ Presently each beneficiary is able to generate an income of Rs. Rs.1,28,000/unit/year
- ♦ The youths under the project are supporting their families with good socio-economic status and also working as social motivator.
- ♦ Every beneficiary is ready to invest more money in expansion of their goat farm so that the goat farms can run in sustainable manner.



#### **Bee-Keeping Enterprise:**

- **55** Selected youths were trained in **2**batches intensively in scientific bee-keeping.
- No. of Youths established entrepreneurial units (No.) since the beginning of the project -69
- ♦ KVK provided bee friendly sapling for plantation, gloves, smokers, bee veil.

#### **Outcome:**

- ♦ At present 69 functional units established under ARYA in bee keeping after KVK interventions like training, input distribution and follow-up.
- ♦ 69 No. of youths running entrepreneurial units in a sustainable manner.
- ♦ Each beneficiary has maintained minimum 15 boxes.
- ♦ The mortality rate in bee-keeping which was 23 % in the beginning has decreased to 9 %.
- ♦ Presently each beneficiary is able to generate gross income of Rs. 1,04,700/unit/year
- ♦ During the reporting period 30 bee boxes have been distributed among the beneficiaries



#### Lac Enterprise:

- ♦ No. of Youths established entrepreneurial units (No.) during the reporting period 7
- No. of Youths established entrepreneurial units (No.) since the beginning of the project 112
- **Solution** KVK provided lac insect friendly Kusum sapling for planting, brood lac, secateurs, fungicide, pesticide, insecticide etc.

#### Outcome:

- ◆ 112 nos. of function Entrepreneurial units established under ARYA in bee keeping after KVK interventions like training, input distribution and follow-up.
- ♦ Each beneficiary has maintained minimum 10host plants.
- ♦ The mortality rate in lac cultivation which was 23 % in the beginning has decreased to 9 %.
- ♦ Presently each beneficiary is able to generate an income of Rs. 171300/unit/year
- ♦ The youths under the project are supporting their families with good socio-economic status and also working as social motivator.

# D.3 Women Empowerment

Women, in the tribal dominated areas of Ranchi and its adjoining areas, have been suffering from various types of discriminations and deprivations due to poverty, low productivity, their primitive way of living and ignorance about socio- moral values. There is a great need to bring women into mainstream of economic activities.

Ramakrishna Mission Ashrama, Divyayan KVK, Morabadi, Ranchi not only organized them to form self help groups but also conducted special training programmes for women in different fields related to skill upgradation, drudgery reduction, fruits and vegetables preservation, value addition, mushroom cultivation, piggery, fisheries, poultry and allied activities to empower them economically as well as socially. Alternative employment opportunities for women are generated through such training programmes. Increased income in the hands of rural women ensures better nutrition, better healthcare facilities and education for their children.

This Ashrama believes that economic empowerment of women with moral and spiritual values at the base will help make them powerful agents to bring about social change.

#### **Distribution of Single Deck Oven**

A single deck oven machine was distributed under KVK(TSP) Programme to Maa Bhubaneswari Mahila Mandal of Gutru Village, located under Burmu Block, to support value addition and food processing initiatives. This intervention aims to enhance local entrepreneurship and promote sustainable livelihoods. The oven will directly benefit 11 female members of the group by enabling them to produce baked goods and processed food items, thereby increasing income opportunities and improving food security.

#### Events organised for nutritional security of rural women and child

**Observance of Nutrition Month:** Nutrition Month was observed throughout September 2024 with a series of awareness and training programs aimed at promoting nutritional well-being among school children, farmers, and farm women. The initiatives focused on balanced diets, nutrition security, and practical dietary guidance tailored to different community groups. A Special Programme on Balanced Diet for School Children at Nawagarh High School, Angara on 18 September 2024 was conducted and the highlights of the programme were Interactive session on the components of a balanced diet and Demonstration of nutritious food combinations using locally available ingredients. In all 34 students participated the programme.

Awareness Programme for Farmers and Farm Women was held at Chhotki gorang Village, Angara Block on 24 September 2024. The highlights of the programme were discussion on the role of nutrition in agricultural productivity and family health and emphasis on incorporating nutrient-rich crops like millets and pulses. Similarly an awareness programme on nutri thali at Gutru village of Burmu Block was organised on 13 Sept. 2024 involving 31 participants.·A one day training programme was also conducted at Divyayan KVK campus involving 40 participants.

**An awareness programme** with a special emphasis on Natural Farming, Millet Production and Millet consumption for food security to rural women was organized on the occasion of 156th birth anniversary



of Sister Nivedita at Khakshitoli village under Nawagarh Panchayat of Angara Block under Ranchi District on 28 October 2024. The chief guest of the programme was Smt. Nirmala Bhagat, Zilla Parishad Adhyaksh. Other guest present were Smt. Anita Gadi, Ex-Block Pramukh, Sri Rajendra Sahi Munda, Zilla Parishad Member. Smt. Bhagat stressed that nutritional food security of the rural women can only achieved through locally available resources. Special lectures on the natural farming by the Divyayan KVK scientists and farmer scientist interaction was held during the programme. The programme was attended by 218 participants.



# **D4. Production of Seed Material & Related Programmes**

The increase in agricultural production directly depends on the quality of seed. Seeds of appropriate characteristics are required to meet the demand of diverse agro-climatic conditions and intensive cropping system. The basic concept behind this programme is to develop a system which will ensure the timely supply of quality seeds to farmers at reasonable rates. To ensure the availability of quality seeds among the farmers, our endeavour is to produce high yielding varieties of the same to gear up the condition of marginal farmers and help lead the country to sufficiency.

Divyayan KVK Ranchi itself has been optimally using its instructional farm for the production of seeds and planting materials for the farmers of Ranchi district. Certified seeds were also produced in the farmers' field by providing them foundation seeds and technical guidance.

During the reporting period seeds of different crops and varieties were produced from our demonstration farms as well as by the farmers under Seed Village Programme as per the details given below to make them available to farmers and Govt. of Jharkhand for further distribution:

### **D5. PPV & FRA Training cum Awareness Programme**

A one-day training and awareness programme on the Protection of Plant Varieties and Farmers' Rights Act, 2001 was organized on 24th March 2025 at the Auditorium of Divyayan KVK, Ranchi. The event aimed to sensitize farmers about the importance of conserving traditional crop varieties and the legal provisions for their protection under PPV & FRA.

The programme was inaugurated by distinguished dignitaries including Dr. Kumar Tarachand (Director Agriculture, Govt. of Jharkhand), Dr. H.C. Singh (Deputy Registrar, PPV & FRA), Sri Vikas Kumar (Director, SAMETI), and Dr. S.B. Samdarshi (State Marketing Manager, IFFCO), among others. A total of 271 farmers from Ranchi district participated.

An exhibition showcased traditional varieties of major crops such as paddy, millets, pulses, oilseeds, spices, and vegetables. Key speakers emphasized the role of farmers in conserving plant genetic resources and the benefits of registering traditional varieties under PPV & FRA.

In the concluding session, 190 applications for variety registration were submitted by farmers, of which 104 were found eligible for further verification and submission to the PPV & FR Authority, New Delhi.

# D.6 Out Scaling of Natural Farming

Natural Farming is a chemical-free farming system rooted in Indian tradition enriched with modern understanding of ecology, resource recycling and on-farm resource optimization. It is considered as agroecology based diversified farming system which integrates crops, trees and livestock with functional biodiversity. Natural farming aims at restoring soil health, maintenance of diversity, ensure animal welfare, stress on efficient use of natural/local resources and promote ecological fairness.

It works with the natural biodiversity, encouraging the soil's biological activity and managing the complexity of living organisms both plant and animal to thrive along with food production system. Important practices, essential for adoption of natural farming includes: No external inputs, Onfarm produced microbial formulation for seed treatment (such as bijamrita), On-farm made microbial inoculants (Jivamrita) for soil enrichment etc.

So, keeping in view the above given views, following activities were organised to create mass awareness among the farmers of Ranchi District.

## **D.7 Mustard Production in Rice Fallow Area**

A Front Line Demonstration programme on mustard was conducted at **Obar** Village under Angara Block and **Chaingarha** and **Gamharia** Village under Burmu Block of Ranchi district in collaboration with **ICAR-DRMR**, **Bharatpur** in 100 acre area. The main objective of the project was to improve tribal farmer's growing practices by undertaking capacity building programmes for the tribal farmers of Ranchi district. The ultimate goal is to increase rapeseed-mustard production in the area to alleviate poverty of the scheduled tribes of the district.

#### Impact of the programme

Previously mustard was taken only as an intercrop with potato and other vegetable in the village. Under this project new high yielding variety BBM-1 was introduced. 107 farmers of the village had cultivated mustard as a sole crop for the first time. After this practice the yield increased by 34.89 % which is a significant achievement not only for income generation but also for nutritional security.



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# D.8 Empowering tribal communities with climate resilient technologies: A pathway to sustainable development in tribal area under TSP (Sponsored by ICAR-Indian Institute of Agricultural Bio-technology, Ranchi)

Interventions like natural farming, goat rearing, and beekeeping are not only important for addressing the economic backwardness of tribal areas but also for promoting environmental sustainability, preserving cultural heritage, enhancing food security, and fostering community resilience through skill development and income diversification.

Economic Empowerment: Many tribal areas suffer from chronic poverty and lack of economic opportunities. Introducing sustainable livelihood options such as natural farming, goat rearing, and beekeeping can provide alternative sources of income for tribal communities.

Environmental Sustainability: Tribal areas often have fragile ecosystems that are vulnerable to exploitation and degradation. Practices like natural farming, beekeeping (which supports pollination and biodiversity), and goat rearing can contribute to environmental conservation and preservation of local biodiversity.

Income Diversification: Dependence on only crop can be risky in tribal areas. Diversifying income sources through activities like natural farming, goat rearing, and beekeeping can stabilize household incomes and reduce vulnerability to economic shocks.

The implementation of these technological interventions has transformed underdeveloped areas by enhancing agricultural productivity, generating employment opportunities, and promoting sustainable practices. This holistic approach has not only improved economic conditions but also contributed to the overall well-being of the community.

Keeping in mind above given facts the objectives of the programm were:

- 1. To promote eco-friendly and sustainable agricultural techniques that reduce dependency on synthetic inputs
- 2. To empower farmers with knowledge and skills necessary for adopting natural farming practices on their own farms
- 3. To Improve goat health by regular vaccination drive.
- 4. To promote beekeeping for income generation

#### To meet the above said objectives following strategies/activities were undertaken:

- 1. Awareness Campaigns: Awareness programme were organised to create mass level awareness
- 2.Community Meetings: Community meetings were organized to inform potential beneficiaries about the project objectives, benefits, and available opportunities.
- 3.Training Programs: Both on-campus and off-campus training programs were conducted on natural farming and beekeeping to enhance the skills and knowledge of participants.
- 4. Continuous Engagement:
- a. Regular Meetings: Group meetings were held at regular intervals to discuss progress, address challenges, and plan collectively. This ensured ongoing engagement and active participation.
- b. Feedback Mechanism: Quarterly review meetings were organized at the KVK level to gather feedback

from participants. Based on the feedback received, strategies and action plans were refined and implemented.

By following this participatory and inclusive methodology, the project ensured the effective selection, mobilization, and sustained involvement of beneficiaries, leading to the successful implementation and long-term sustainability of natural farming, beekeeping, and goat-rearing activities.

# Yoga Practice and Seminar cum workshop Under 100 Day Count Down of 9th International Day of Yoga

#### **World Bee Day**

Farmers were informed about how beekeeping integrates well with various livelihood activities, as it utilizes the same natural resources as forestry, agriculture, and conservation initiatives.

On this occasion, a 93.96 kWp Solar Rooftop System, installed under the Corporate Social Responsibility (CSR) initiative of Central Coalfields Limited (CCL), Ranchi, was formally inaugurated by Sri Nilendu Kumar Singh, Chairman and Managing Director, CCL. The event was graced by Sri Harsh Nath Mishra, Director (Personnel), CCL Ranchi.


# i. Charitable Dispensary



In all, 10620 patients were treated by this unit and the patients were provided with medicines free of cost. Besides the medical treatment, health education and awareness programme among the villagers were also conducted as before.













### iii and iv. Naren Eye Care and Vivekananda Eye Camp Programme

This Ashrama, in collaboration with Blind Foundation for India, USA, has been executing Naren Eye Care (For Children) and Vivekananda Eye Camp Programme (Cataract detection and operation for adult) since 2010 for providing eye care service to the rural children and adult deprived of all types of medical facilities. Generally the headmasters of respective schools are contacted through our volunteers of Vivekandna Seva Sangh to fix the date of the camp. Then in the camp, eye check-up is done followed by a small awareness meeting on the "Proper Care of Eye". Once the children are identified with problem in eye sight they are provided with spectacles in the next camp. Children are also provided with medicines like vitamin-A, de-worming tablets, eye drop etc. The cataract operation camps are also organised for the elderly people. After the identification of cataract, proper medical tests are done before cataract surgery.

To execute this programme successfully, this Ashrama has a collaboration with Niramaya Hospital, Ranchi, which bore all the operation and post operation costs. The performance record of this programme for the year 2024-25 is as given below:

### i. Rural Education:

The present education system, with its narrow focus on preparing students for white-collar jobs, is inadvertently contributing to poverty and unemployment by neglecting the development of creativity and free thinking in children. This rigid and burdensome approach demands a complete overhaul in strategy and delivery, calling for a model that makes learning joyful, curiosity-driven, and stress-free.

In this regard this Ashrama have been assisting **primary schools and Akhandananda Shiksha and Sanskar Kendras and Gurukula Centres** run by NGOs and Vivekananda Seva Sanghas formed by our ex-trainees at Angara, Burmu, Bero, Mandar, Tamar Blocks under Ranchi District and Murhu Block under Khunti Districts.

A unique technique of teaching has been developed which includes games, models, demonstration, discussions, charts, maps as learning implements vis-a-vis books. Creativity development is brought through sketches, paintings, model making and use of geometry box.

Under unique teaching technique students were guided to play special types of games aimed at enhancing the power of concentration, memory, alertness and smartness leading to the personality development. For integrated development of the children special classes are conducted for Yoga, meditation, PT and marching practices. Children are made aware of Health & Hygiene. Periodical medical check-ups are arranged.

Besides the regular primary schools, most of our **Akhandananda Shiksha and Sanskar Kendras** are conducting evening coaching classes in their respective villages. Besides the regular course, value education classes are also conducted in these coaching centres to inculcate the feelings that man is potentially divine and religion is the manifestation of the divinity in man. Emphasis is given on cultivation of goodness - 'Be good and help others to be good'.

### i.a Maa Sarada Gurkul at Chipibandihi, Tamar

Swami Vivekananda believed that education is the panacea for all evils. He wanted Indians to get that education, which would instil a tremendous sense of atmashraddha, self-belief. A student with self-belief would never feel inferior to any other student. Keeping in view of the words of Swamiji, this Ashrama in association with Soul Divine, USA has undertaken an ambitious programme to promote education among the children of Primitive Tribes at Chipibandhi village of Tamar Block Under Ranchi District.

#### I Objectives of the Programme:

- 1. To create interest in education through residential coaching centre
- 2. To provide quality education through innovative method
- 3. To reduce drop out in formal elementary/primary school
- 4. To prepare primitive tribal students to quality in admission test held for better schools like Navodaya Vidyalay, Kasturba Gandhi schools, Eklavya Schools, Sainik schools etc
- 5. Ultimate objective is to promote education among the children of Primitive Tribes to mainstreaming them.

#### Integrated Education

The activities undertaken during the year 2024-25 are as follows:

#### **Educational Activities:**

Regular classes were successfully conducted for students of Class I to V, accommodating a full strength of 50 children from the Birhore and Munda tribal communities. To ensure effective communication and cultural resonance, qualified tribal youths from the same village were engaged as teachers. The teaching process was enriched through the use of educational charts and models, fostering interactive and visual learning. A well-structured daily routine was implemented to promote the holistic development of each child, encompassing yoga and physical training, academic engagement, formal school attendance, sports activities, nutritional garden involvement, evening coaching sessions, audio-visual learning modules, and regular assessments.

A Nutritional (Kitchen) Garden has been developed as a highly practical and experiential learning space, enabling children to understand the fundamentals of growing healthy food. This hands-on approach not only fosters better health and nutrition but also cultivates essential skills that support future livelihood opportunities and self-sufficiency. Beyond agricultural and horticultural practices, the garden serves as a dynamic living laboratory for exploring environmental issues and life sciences. The inclusion of freshly grown vegetables plays a vital role in combating malnutrition and addressing micronutrient deficiencies among children, thereby contributing to their overall well-being and cognitive development.

#### **Infrastructural Improvement**



#### **Sports activity:**

For integrated development of health children are made to play different games like football, volleyball, fitness rope. All required sports equipment has been provided for these games





#### **Medical Camps:**

Once in a month, special medical camps are held for students to assess the health condition of the students. Medical camps are held by different agencies like SSB (Seema Suraksha Bal), Govt. Doctor and doctors from Ramakrishna Mission Ashrama, Morabadi, Ranchi. A register is maintained to monitor BMI (Body Mass Index) of each children.





#### **Monthly Assessment:**

Monthly assessment of children is conducted to assess whether students have met the standards or learning objectives.

#### **Events Celebrated**

#### i.b Akhandananda Shiksha and Sanskar Kendra (ASSK)

The transformative message of Sri Ramakrishna and Swami Vivekananda deeply inspired Swami Akhandananda, a direct disciple of Sri Ramakrishna, to initiate rural development work long before the formal establishment of the Ramakrishna Mission. As a wandering monk in Khetri, Rajasthan, in 1894, Swami Akhandananda went door to door to raise awareness about the importance of education. His tireless efforts led to a significant increase in student enrollment at the Khetri Rajya English School—from 80 to 200. Motivated by his vision, the Maharaja of Khetri introduced educational provisions for the Golas (illiterate slaves) and established a permanent education department to promote village-level schooling.

Inspired by Swami Akhandananda's pioneering work, the Morabadi centre of Ramakrishna Mission Ashrama launched the Akhandananda Shiksha and Sanskar Kendra project on 12th October 2015, commemorating the 150th Birth Anniversary of Swami Akhandananda. The initiative aims to integrate academic, vocational, and moral education for children in rural areas, aligning with Swami Vivekananda's vision of man-making and character-building education.

#### **Project Objectives and Scope**

- Prepare Class V students for entrance exams to institutions like Navodaya Vidyalaya, Kasturba Gandhi Balika Vidyalaya, and Ekalavya Vidyalaya.
- Promote holistic development through a blend of curricular and extracurricular activities.
- Instill values, discipline, and leadership qualities in rural children.

#### **Operational Coverage**

- Currently, 47 centres are operational across five blocks of Ranchi district: Angara, Burmu, Bero, Tamar, and Kanke.
- These centres are managed by Vivekananda Seva Sanghas, village-level organizations formed by extrainees of Divyayan.
- Total student enrollement across 47 active centres stands at 1,689, comprising 762 boys and 927 girls.



#### **Daily Schedule and Curriculum**

Classes are conducted six days a week, excluding Sundays.

4:00 PM – 6:00 PM: Activities include Yoga, games, personal hygiene, cleanliness, prayer, Swadesh Mantra, and chanting.

6:00 PM – 8:00 PM: Academic sessions covering Mathematics, Science, English, Hindi, Social Studies, and General Knowledge.

#### **Special Initiatives**

- · Annual Leadership Training is provided to enhance confidence and community engagement.
- · A Quiz and Yoga Competition (2024–25) was organized, focusing on the ideas and ideals of Swami

#### i.c Gadadhar Abhyudaya Prakalpa

The children in modern society, being fortunate enough to have come under the influence of technological development and other sweeping changes in socio-political sphere, are empowered by the benefits of a global way of life. On the other hand, a still larger section of children in society, caught in the jaws of poverty, illiteracy, superstition, and narrow-mindedness, are unable to break through the entry barriers to the benefits of modernization.


Keeping in mind, this project was launched in the year 2010 as a part of the 4-year long 150th Birth Anniversary Celebration of Swami Vivekananda, for the 3-fold development of the needy and backward children – physical, mental and intellectual, and since then, it has been running up till now.

Under this project during 2024-25, 476 children were covered belonging to economically backward families. It was mainly aimed at developing physical, mental and intellectual strength of the children. The project was carried out at 9 locations of Ranchi and Khunti District.

To improve the health of the children, they were provided with nutritive food like milk (250 ml. to each per day), gram, corn flakes, flattened rice, dalia, ground nut, pea etc.

To inculcate better hygienic practice, toiletries like tooth paste, tooth brush, coconut oil, soaps were provided on regular basis to the beneficiaries.

The basic training on cleanliness, awareness about







general health and hygiene was given to the children by highly educated supervisors and mentors who are experts in these areas. They visited the unit weekly.

Value education session of 30 minutes was conducted through pictorial moral storybooks at least once in a week by the teacher and sometimes by the supervisors and mentors.

The children were made to grow the habit of planting flower, vegetables etc. Responsibilities were distributed among the children. They worked in team to clean the classroom and surroundings etc.

Helath checkup camps were also conducted for Children to monitor their health status periodically. They were provided with iron supplements and protein rich diet.

For development of moral and aesthetic value, classes on Vedic and Gita chanting along with meditation, yoga, music and drama were also organised as an integral part of the programme.

#### i.d Vivekananda Abhyudaya Prakalpa

Under this project special coaching is given to the poor students for Class VII to class X. Classes on English, mathematics, science, spoken English and computer are taken. In all **40** students were covered under this programme

#### ii. Block Level Youth Conventions

Swami Vivekananda always emphasized the potential in the youth and how this potentiality can be channelized for the welfare of the society. He had addressed this issue directly in many of his speeches.

It was deeply felt that the youth of the country must be made aware of their inherent power and this power should be channelized to build the nation. It is the need of the hour that to make them understand their role in the development of the nation.

Keeping the above objectives in mind, 4 (Four) Block level youth conventions were carried out involving **1035** participants. The details of the youth convention is as given in next page:

Group discussion on various topics on Rural development, Problem of Unemployment and its solution, Health & hygiene and cultural and social development. In each and every convention special classes on yoga, meditation and physical education were carried out. The participants were also made to present cultural programme on National Integration.



### iii. National Institute of Open Schooling

Ramakrishna Mission Ashrama, Divyayan Krishi Vigyan Kendra, Morabadi, Ranchi, successfully continued its endeavour for the upliftment of rural youth in the field of sustainable education through synergy of formal education, multi-skill vocational education with moral education to make the youth self-reliant as envisaged by Swami Vivekananda.

Despite massive expansion of the education system in the country, a large number of adolescents and

youths, particularly from the economically weaker sections and in rural areas, are not able to acquire school education. In this backdrop, Ramakrishna Mission Ashrama, during extensive rural development work, realised that integrating vocational education at Divyayan with school education with the help of National Institute of Open Schooling (NIOS) can provide necessary employability skill and at the same time, underprivileged and poor rural youths particularly tribal, can get the opportunity for higher education in college and University. That innovative and noble approach yields wonderful result. With a motto, 'to educate every rural youth' We have initiated distant education through NIOS and since the year 2001, Ramakrishna Mission Ashrama, Ranchi, is working as an accredited Institute of NIOS, During the reporting year **86** students in secondary, **177** in senior secondary courses have been enrolled.

To sustain this approach, we have developed a mechanism that, rural youths, particularly school dropouts who have come for undertaking vocational training at Divyayan for long duration course, are given the opportunity for secondary and senior secondary courses of NIOS along with multiskilled vocational courses of Divyayan and also of NIOS, free of cost. After successful completion, they may further join different diplomas/degrees/certificate courses offered by Ramakrishna Mission Vivekananda Education and Research Institute (RKMVERI), in the Faculty of Agriculture Rural and Tribal Development (ARTD), Morabadi, Ranchi, through formal procedure. As of now, twenty-four (30) rural youths who took training at Divyayan, have completed degree. Out of which 20 graduates and 10 master degree from RKMVERI and all of them are well established in different institutions.

#### iv. Library

This static library has a suitable building of 4000 sq. feet (approx). It has **23768** books as on 31.3.2025 to cater to the needs of all ages. It is a unique and only free public library, in this part of the city and provides its services mainly to school and college going students and to those who prepare for the various competitive examinations. This library is very popular among students of Ranchi University, Ramakrishna Mission Vivekananda Educational and Research Institute and research scholars because of it's quiet environment and availability of large spectrum of reading material on wide and varied subjects. The library was visited by **34813** readers during 2024-25.



#### v. 54th Annual Competitions - 2024-25

Under Rebuild India campaign, 54th Annual competition was held in hybrid mode covering the entire state of Jharkhand. The theme of the competition was "Naya Bharat Gadho". The purpose of this competition is to acquaint our youths to our rich cultural heritage and to the powerful speeches and writings of Swami Vivekananda. We believe that the students have a very impressionable mind and if we mould them now, it would decide the future of our country.

Students, teachers and others from the state of Jharkhand, participated the competition in three events viz. Quiz, Recitation and Essay Writing competition. The competition received more than **24990** (both online and offline) registrations from students, teachers and others registered for these events. This year different district level nodal agency were formed to smoothen the process of registration and competition. Like last year, the state level winners were given cash award on the occasion of National Youth Day, 12 January 2025.

The main features of the competition were a) Free online registration b) E-certificates to all participants c) Cash prize for First -Rs. 5000, Second-Rs. 3000 and Third-Rs. 2000 for each event d) Best School Award depending upon number of participation.

Prize Distribution Ceremony for 54th Annual Competition, 2024-25 was held on the Occasion of National Youth Day and the chief guest of the occasion was **Hon'ble Sri Santosh Kumar Gangwar, Governor of Jharkhand**. Dr. Deepak Kumar; Director, IIM, Ranchi, Sri Punit Kumar Poddar, CMD, Maruti Udyog Pvt. Limited were the Guests of Honour.

Delhi Public School, Ranchi received the special trophy for being the best school of the 54th Annual Competition in terms of highest no. of prizes won and highest participation from the school. 28 individual prize winners were awarded certificates, books & cash prize.

#### **About The University:**

Ramakrishna Mission Vivekananda Educational and Research Institute (formerly known as Ramakrishna Mission Vivekananda University) is the first step in actualization of Swami Vivekananda's vision that Belur Math would develop into an all-round University. It was declared by Government of India through its Ministry of Human Resource Development on the advice of University Grants Commission as an institution deemed-to-be-university under Section 3 of UGC Act, 1956 by a Gazette Notification No. F.9-54/2004-U.3 dated 5 January 2005. The University was formally inaugurated by the Most Revered Swami Gahanananda ji Maharaj, President of Ramarishna Math and Mission on 4 July 2005, the sacred day of mahasamadhi (passing way) of Swami Vivekananda. With the asset of vast experiences of the Ramakrishna Mission Ashrama, Morabadi for more than eight decades and Divyayan Krishi Vigyan Kendra (KVK) for more than three decades, Ramakrishna Mission Vivekananda Educational and Research Institute, Belur Math decided to establish a faculty centre for 'Integrated Rural & Tribal Development and Management (IRTDM)' at Morabadi, Ranchi, Jharkhand. The appeal was accepted and approval was given to this centre as an 'Off-campus Faculty Centre' by the University Grant Commission (UGC) after an inspection of six members team from 29 to 30 June 2006, vide notification No. F.6-96/2004(CPP-I) dated 3 July 2006. In 2019, faculty of ARTD has been restructured into two independent divisions for academic and administrative clarity.

### 4. Extension Activities of the ARTD Faculty

The faculty centre conducts both intensive and extensive fieldwork for the students to acquire knowledge about the real-life situation through participatory interactions with the villagers. Students study villages extensively, identify resources available, problems etc.

- a) Village & Institutional visits: In each semester students must do educational visits to different villages and Govt. & Non-Govt. organizations/Institutions for detailed study under different course. Students have visited the following villages during the reporting period Nawagarh, Ara Keram, Kuchu Pahan Tola, Chipibanddihi, Dublabera, Karkare, Dhurleta, Kharkutoli, Tirlakocha, Obar etc. Institutional visits conducted during the reporting period includes Primary Health Centre (PHC), Bero; ASHA, Birsa Agricultural University, Kokar Indistrial Area, Central Tasar Training and Research Institute (CTTRI), Nagri; IINRG, Namkom, Birsa Zoological Garden, Biodiversity Park.
- **b) Village Level Youth Convention:** During the reporting period, research scholars actively participated in three village-level youth conventions conducted on 29.11.2024, 03.12.24 and 10.12.2024 at Sursu village, Angara, Sakarpur, Lapung and Geswe village, Burmu respectively organized by

Ramakrishna Mission Ashrama, Ranchi. PhD students helped with registration, cultural events, and delivering speeches about Swami Vivekananda. The programme was a grand success, and it provided the scholars with an excellent learning opportunity.

- **c) Kisan Mela:** In collaboration with Divyayan Krishi Vigyan Kendra, the ARTD faculty center organised regional and central Kisan Melas, in which students and staff from the faculty centre actively participated.
- **d) Blood Donation Camp:** Conducted **blood donation camp** on 29.10.2024 in collaboration with Rajendra Institute of Medical Sciences (RIMS), Ranchi in which 39 donors (mainly students, research scholars, teaching and non-teaching staff of Ranchi Faculty Centre) donated blood. The programme was sponsored by the Union Bank of India as part of the vigilance awareness week.
- **e) Joy of Learning Programme (JoLP):** The Joy of Learning Program (JoLP) is a unique initiative involving our students, teachers, and farmers of rural Jharkhand. The program's motto, "to know joyfully from the village farming," emphasizes experiential learning and the joy of acquiring knowledge directly from practical experiences. During the reporting period three JoLP were conducted.

# 5. Rural Agricultural Work Experience (RAWE) and Agro-Industrial Attachment (AIA) of Ag-2021 Batch

The Rural Agricultural Work Experience (RAWE), including Agro-industrial Attachment (AIA) is automated in Seventh Semester of B.Sc. (Hons.) Agriculture programme in which students have to stay in different villages for two months, in KVK and other ICAR institutes for two weeks and in different agro-industries for two months. During the reporting period, 23 students stayed at four different villages of Jharkhand from January to March, 2025

#### 6. Learning through Organizational Attachment (LOA)

The students of the 8th semester of ARTD and 2nd semester of RDM were sent to the different organizations and have completed their Learning through Organizational Attachment (LOA) curriculum successfully. A total of 62 students were attached with sixteen organizations for two months (April–May, 2024) during the reporting period.

#### 7. Placement Report - 2024

#### **Division of Rural and Tribal Development**

During the Campus Placement Program, 2024 different organizations have been invited for placement of students. Among them, Professional Assistance for Development Action (PRADAN), Ranchi, SRIJAN, New Delhi, Drishtee Foundation, New Delhi, HUMBLE BEE, Buzzworthy Ventures, Bengaluru (KR), Gramashri Foundation Trust, Jaipur (RJ), Karuna Sechen, Jamshedpur (JH), Sushila Foundation for Agriculture and Rural Development, Ranchi, Farmerface Organic Technology & Research Institute Pvt. Ltd., Siwan (BR), Support, Hazaribagh (JH), Chandlaso Honey Farmer Producer Company Limited, Chandlaso, Lohardaga (JH) have conducted the campus placement. 90% students including both ARTD and RDM got placement through campus selection. 





Sarita Devi's leadership extended beyond personal ambition. Guided by the belief:

"When tradition is combined with innovation, real change comes in society," she reimagined Ragi not just as a staple, but as a thriving enterprise. Her vision galvanized rural women to embrace entrepreneurship, sparking a ripple effect of empowerment.

### **Training to Triumph**

Through trainings conducted by Divyayan Krishi Vigyan Kendra, Sarita and her team mastered techniques in:

- · Ragi processing and value addition
- · Packaging and labeling for market appeal
- · Business management and grassroots marketing

### **Market Penetration & Income Generation**

Sarita's team began showcasing Ragi-based products—cookies, cakes, laddus, sev, and biscuits—at local fairs and exhibitions. With growing consumer awareness and appreciation, their brand flourished across Ranchi's marketplaces. Monthly incomes soared up to  $\Box 65,000$ , transforming households and aspirations alike.

Beyond profit, Sarita Devi ensured other rural women joined her journey. Her initiative fostered a strong sense of community, collaboration, and skill-sharing, redefining what grassroots entrepreneurship can look like.

### Championing Natural Farming: The Journey of Sri. Shiv Charan Bedia

### From Rain-fed Struggles to Regenerative Success

Born into a family dependent on traditional rain-fed paddy farming, Sri Shiv Charan Bedia, a 35-year-old progressive farmer, chose a bold path. With just 0.5 acres in 2016 and guidance from **Divyayan Krishi Vigyan Kendra**, Shiv Charan embraced natural farming, and today, he cultivates 2 acres under this sustainable system, powered by drip irrigation and regenerative techniques.



### **Natural Farming for Self-Reliance**

Shiv Charan ji's transition eliminated dependency on commercial agro-inputs (except seeds). Surrounded by forested land, he prepares his own bio-pesticides and growth enhancers—Dashaparni, Neemastra, Agniastra, and Brahmastra—under-scoring the ecological intelligence behind his practice. Remarkably, he achieves commercial yields using hybrid vegetable seeds from private sector providers, proving that natural farming is both sustainable and productive.

In 1998, Sri Manrakhan Mahto laid the groundwork for his apiculture journey by completing a 45-day beekeeping training at **KVK Ranchi**. Armed with modern practices in hive management and honey extraction, he cultivated a passion for sustainable beekeeping.

### **Entrepreneurial Leap**

His vision took shape in 2019 with the founding of Amar Sanjeevni Natural Bee Product Pvt. Ltd., engaging 30 active members and focusing on eco-friendly honey production. By 2023–24, Sri Mahto further scaled his efforts by establishing a honey processing plant, adding significant value to his enterprise.



### **Technical Backbone**

Key apiculture technologies employed include:

- Bee Species: Apis mellifera for high-yield honey collection
- · Infrastructure: Wooden hives, 10-frame systems, queen excluders
- · Support Tools: Smokers, bee veils, gloves for safe hive operations

### **Economic & Social Impact**

Prior to entrepreneurship, Sri Mahto earned barely Rs.6,000–7,000 monthly through traditional farming. Post-establishment, his income rose substantially, allowing diversification and financial stability. His transformation into a role model for rural youth in Ranchi is a testament to grit and innovation.

### **Knowledge Sharing & Recognition**

With ongoing support from KVK Ranchi, which offers advanced 90-day training programs, Sri Mahto continues to empower budding apiculturists, advocating for livelihood diversification through scientific beekeeping.

In addition to teaching on school curriculum, they are given opportunity and support to manifest their potential talents in Yoga, sports and other co-curricular activities, kitchen gardening, keeping campus clean and green etc. Other activities like celebrating different national & social programmes and different assignments to impart patriotism, respect their own culture are also being organised throughout the year.

This mentor scheme has been launched to give you an opportunity to play a role in nation building and development by helping the budding future citizen of the country through which a concrete and permanent development can be achieved.

### A few important points for Mentors:

- 1. A Mentor can himself/herself select a **Akhandananda Shiksha Evam Sanskar Kendra** to adopt.
- 2. He or She may interact with the students & teachers time to time online/offline for monitoring their overall development.
- 3. He or She may implement his/her innovative idea for overall development of children with prior permission from the Ashrama.
- 4. A mentor will donate only **Rs 30,000/ (Thirty thousand) annually** to the Ashrama office along with a copy of Aadhar card & pan number. Donation receipt will make the person entitled for income tax rebate of 50% amount U/S 80 G.
- 5. The teacher of the Kendra adopted by the donor will receive Rs 2000/= per month for 12 months from Ashrama regularly.
- 6. Balance of Rs 6000/ (Six thousand) only will be utilised for miscellaneous expenses of the ASSK.
- 7. A mentor should be a respectable man / woman, above 18 years age, who has interest in child welfare & education.
- 8. Students & teachers of the adopted Kendra may also meet donor on mutually convenient date, time, and place. A family relationship is to be developed.
- 9. The effort of the mentor will be properly acknowledged through a display with his photo and name in the prominent place of the Kendra.

### M. An Appeal

This Ashrama was established in the year 1927 by Srimat Swami Vishuddhananda ji, the direct disciple of Holy Mother Sarada Devi, and the 8th President of Ramakrishna Order. In early sixties, when the adjoining districts to Ranchi were in the grip of severe drought, this Ashrama organized distress relief operation. During the relief work, it was strongly felt that unless the resource-poor and illiterate farmers are trained in need-based agricultural technology supported by group action, they would never be able to counter similar adverse conditions in future. In order to fulfill the above requirements a novel integrated rural development model was conceived and a free residential institute was launched by this centre in 1969 under the name 'Divyayan' for imparting training to village youths, particularly Tribals, in scientific agriculture, dairy, poultry, bee-keeping, horticulture, farm machinery, carpentry, welding, electrician, pump repairing, etc. and social service. The institute was recognized as Krishi Viyan Kendra in the year 1977. As a mark of appreciation for its objectives and method of imparting training right from its inception, it has been awarded as the best KVK amongst nearly 540 KVKs of the country for the year 1997-98 and as the best KVK in the Zone-IV for the year 2015-16. It has again received best KVK award for the year 2016-17, 2018-19 amongst nearly 650 KVKs of the country. It is not gainsaying the fact that Divyayan (meaning Divine Way) has become verily the temple for the worship of God in man.

The objectives of the training programme are to make the village youths self reliant and break free themselves from the shackles of poverty. After acquiring the skill, it is expected that they will be able to establish small enterprises related to agriculture and allied trades by using the available local resources. In this way, they will be employing themselves and may create jobs for others too.

The residential training programmes for the tribals, as mentioned above, are mainly sponsored by the Ministry of Tribal Welfare(MTW), Govt. of India (GOI) for 80 trainees per year. But the fund sanctioned and released by the MTW, GOI for these training programmes is too meagre to meet the expenses over the trainees' boarding and food, Salary for the Trainers, Administrative staffs, other employees and establishment. As such we solely depend on the donations from our benevolent donors to meet the essential extra expenditure to keep up this training programmes for the tribal. In addition to this, we need fund for celebration of Thakur, Maa and Swamiji's tithi pujas and several cultural and spiritual programmes organized through out the year.

In this context, we would like to appeal for liberal donations from the well wishers and philanthropists to join us to carry out this novel work for the redemption of poverty in villages.
